Green Island Beach / Green Island, Antigua & Barbuda

The place is practically deserted, with turquoise water as far as the eye can see and lush greenery flanking the white sand. Green Island Beach comes straight out of tropical island central casting.

Of the Antiguan islands, Green Island is your best bet for some privacy: it's out of the way and can only be reached by charter boat. Once you're on the island there are a number of

WHAT'S ON THE ITINERARY?

It's a packed schedule of sunbathing, snoozing and snorkelling. Not necessarily in that order.

GOOD SNORKELLING TO BE HAD?

Calm and clear, the water stays relatively shallow for a way out to sea so it's perfect for gently bobbing around with your head immersed. The rock formations around the edges of the cove make for some interesting exploring too.





Hot Water Beach / Coromandel Peninsula, New Zealand

ARE WE HOT TUBBING?

DIY style. When you visit this beach, a spade is a required piece of kit. Two subterranean fissures allow hot spring water to bubble up through the sand. Grab your spade and dig yourself (and your friends) a cosy little Jacuzzi and let the warmth surround you.

Charmouth Beach / Dorset, UK
