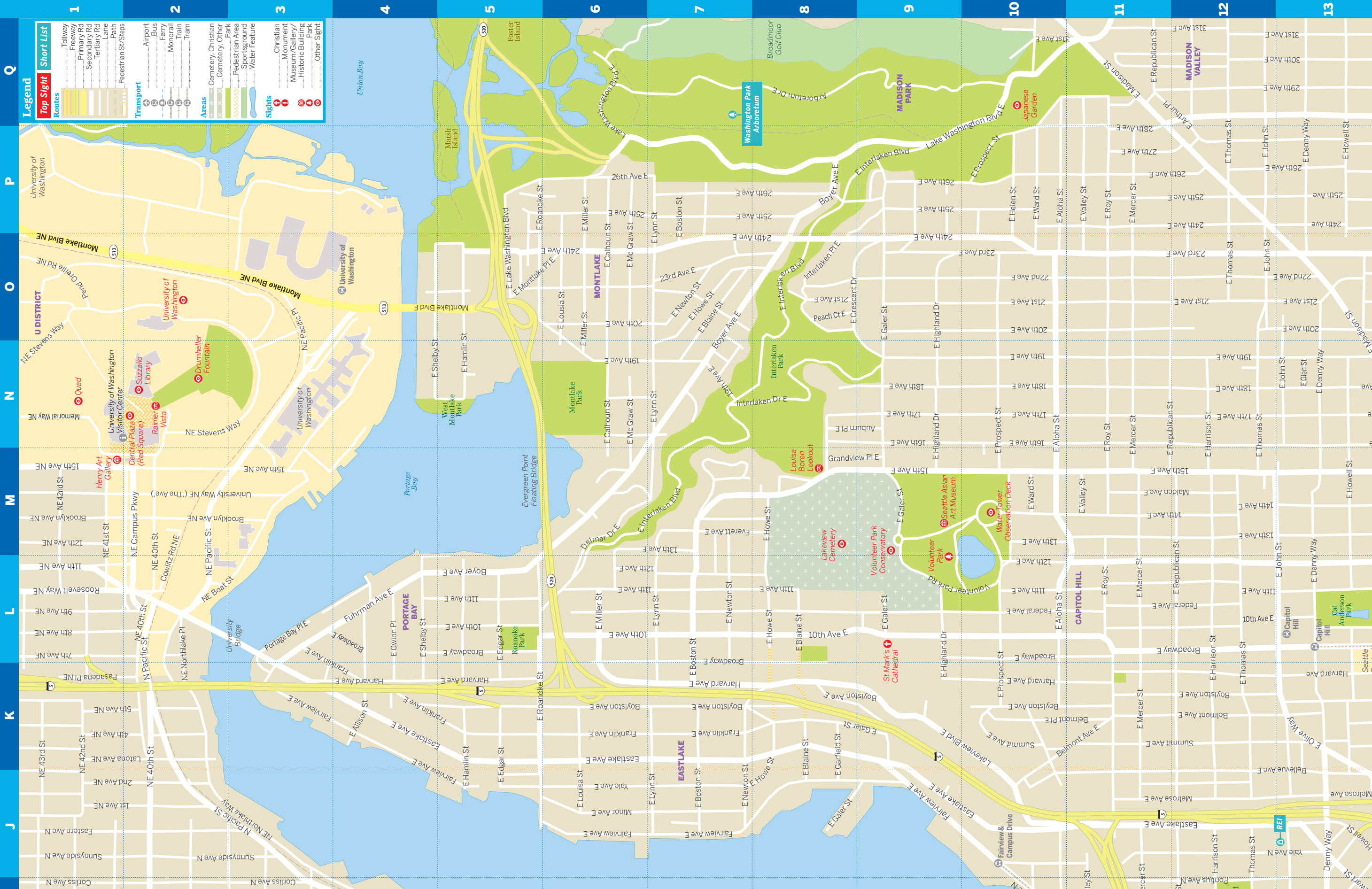

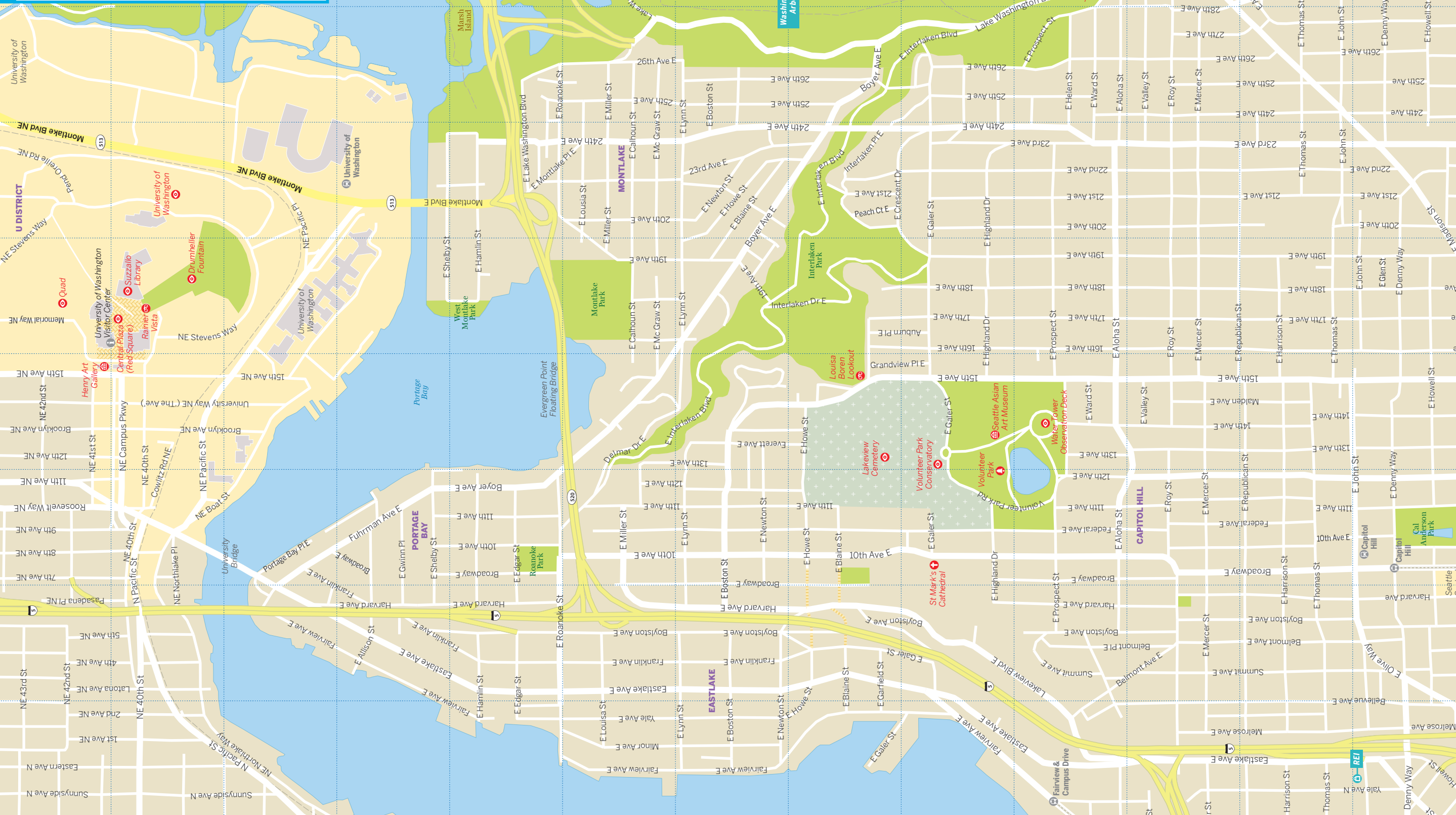

SPACE NEEDLE

The defining symbol of Seattle for more than 50 years, this streamlined, modern-before-its-time tower was built for the 1962 World's Fair. (www.spaceneedle.com; 400 Broad St; ☎10am-9:30pm; 🚶 Seattle Center)

SEATTLE ART MUSEUM

Always recurating its art collection with new acquisitions and imported temporary exhibitions, SAM is known for its extensive Native American artifacts and work from the local Northwest school. (SAM; www.seattleartmuseum.org; 1300 1st Ave; ☎10am-5pm Wed & Fri-Sun, to 9pm Thur; 🚶 University St)

CHIHULY GARDEN & GLASS

An exquisite exposition of the life and work of local glass sculptor Dale Chihuly, with masterpieces spread over an exhibition center, a glasshouse and a garden. (www.chihulygardenandglass.com; 305 W Harrison St; ☎11am-6pm Sun-Thu, to 7pm Fri & Sat; 🚶 Seattle Center)

MUSEUM OF POP CULTURE

This dramatic marriage of super-modern architecture and rock-and-roll history was inspired by the music of Seattle-born guitar icon Jimi Hendrix. (www.empmuseum.org; 325 5th Ave N; ☎10am-7pm Jun-Aug, to 5pm Sep-May; 🚶 Seattle Center)

GREEN LAKE PARK

A favorite haunt for recreationalists and sunbathers, scenic Green Lake Park is packed with crowds in summer, but it's even better in fall, when the leaves are changing. (🚶62)

MUSEUM OF HISTORY & INDUSTRY

Almost everything you need to know about Seattle is crammed into the refurbished Museum of History & Industry, the centerpiece of Lake Union Park. (MOHAI; www.mohai.org; 860 Terry Ave N; ☎10am-5pm, to 8pm 1st Thu of month; 🚶 Lake Union Park)

SEATTLE SHORT LIST

HISTORY BUFFS

- Klondike Gold Rush National Historical Park (J19)** One of the best museums in Seattle – and it's free too!
- Nordic Heritage Museum (B16)** Dedicated to the brave Nordic pioneers who helped found the neighborhood (then a separate city) in the late 19th century.
- Tillicum Village (G17)** Get a candid taste of how the Duwamish tribe lived at the purpose-built Tillicum Village on Blake Island.
- Pioneer Square Historical District (H18)** One of the oldest and most historic districts in Seattle.



CULTURE CULTURES

- A Contemporary Theatre (H15)** The ACT fills its \$30 million home with performances by Seattle's best thespians.
- Seattle Symphony (Q16)** Nationally renowned, this orchestra plays in Seattle's finest concert hall, the Benaroya.
- Frye Art Museum (K16)** This small museum preserves the collection of Charles and Emma Frye, and hosts sensitively curated temporary shows.
- Pacific Northwest Ballet (E11)** The foremost ballet company in the Northwest.



GETTING AROUND

TRANSPORTATION

- Bus** Run by King County Metro Transit on a wide number of routes. Buses are pay-as-you-enter and cost a peak-time flat fee of \$2.75/1.50 per adult/child.
- Light Rail** Regular all-day service on one line between Sea-Tac airport and the University of Washington via downtown.
- Streetcar** Two lines. South Lake Union line runs from Westlake Center to South Lake Union every 15 minutes. First Hill line runs from Pioneer Square to Capitol Hill. Fares

FREMONT PUBLIC SCULPTURE

MUSEUM OF FLIGHT

The remarkable Museum of Flight chronicles flight history from Kitty Hawk to Concorde. (www.museumofflight.org; 9404 E Marginal Way S, Boeing Field; ☎9am-5pm; 🚶124)

DISCOVERY PARK

The largest green space in Seattle at 534 acres, Discovery Park boasts cliffs, dunes, meadows, forest and beaches. It's a one-time military installation reborn as a textbook example of urban sustainability. (www.seattle.gov/parks/environment/discovery.htm; 🚶33)
