Why Go?

Tanzania is the land of safaris, with wildebeest stampeding across the plains, hippos jostling for space in rivers, elephants kicking up the dust and chimpanzees swinging through the treetops.

Tanzania's magical Indian Ocean coastline also entrances, with its tranquil islands, long beaches and sleepy villages steeped in centuries of Swahili culture. Coconut palms sway in the breeze, dhows glide by on the horizon and colourful fish flit past spectacular corals in the turquoise waters.

When to Go

Dodoma



Mar-May Heavy rains bring green landscapes, lower prices, top-notch birding and muddy roads. Jun-Aug The weather is cool and dry throughout, and wildlife watching is at its prime.

Sep-Oct The weather continues dry, and wildlife watching remains good, without the crowds.
