A New Beginning

In December 2015 Mauricio Macri took over Argentina's presidential reins. He had been Buenos Aires' mayor since 2007 and was a former president of the Boca Juniors *fútbol* team. In a surprising run-off election he narrowly beat Cristina Kirchner's preferred candidate, Daniel Scioli, ending 12 years of Peronist-run government. Macri promised drastic economic changes, and he immediately started implementing them: controls over foreign currencies were abolished (essentially ending the 'blue' – ie black – market for US dollars), export taxes were lowered to boost agricultural trade, and thousands of redundant public-sector jobs were eliminated.

His idea is to encourage economic growth and foreign investment (once again) while reducing Argentina's immense deficit and, eventually, its unsustainable inflation rate. It's quite a difference from Cristina Kirchner's practices, which implemented heavy state intervention and spending, and used the country's central bank reserves to artificially prop up the peso. Macri also plans to strengthen ties with economic powers like Brazil and the USA, while cooling off relations with Iran and Venezuela, which Cristina had forged. His pro-business, free-market reform stances set him apart from his leftist, pro-government predecessor. Argentines asked for a radically different president – and they got one.

Economic Woes

Argentina's currency devaluation in 2002 caused surging demand for its suddenly cheap agricultural products. Helped along by skyrocketing government spending and strong growth in Brazil and China, this economic boom lasted through 2007 and revved up again in 2010. But high inflation, a stronger peso and lower commodity prices reined in the economy.
