
Drum Tower & Dongchéng North

Neighbourhood Top Five

- ① Lose yourself in the mazelike network of historic **hútòng** (alleyways), or follow our *hútòng* walking tour (p89).
- 2 Stroll the incense-filled halls and courtyards of the Lama Temple (p84), Běijīng's largest and most impressive Buddhist temple.
- 3 Listen to a drumming performance inside the magnificent ancient **Drum Tower** (p86) before climbing its equally impressive neighbour, the **Bell Tower** (p87).
- 4 Browse the cutesy boutique shops on **Nanluogu** Xiang (p88), before sneaking into a courtyard cafe for coffee break.
- **5** Catch a local band at one of the many excellent live-music venues in this part of town: **Jiāng Hú** (p101) is a good place to start.



Explore Drum Tower & Döngchéng North

This hútòng-rich neighbourhood incorporates the northern section of Běijīng's historic Dōngchéng (东城) District and is the most pleasant area in which to base yourself during your stay in the capital. Book yourself into a hútông hostel or a beautifully converted courtyard hotel, and make this most charming of neighbourhoods your new temporary home.

While there are less top-name sights here than in Döngchéng Central, there is still some sightseeing to be done, although the main attraction is the chance to simply wander around the lanes getting lost.

You can shop till you drop in the cute alleyway boutiques of Nanluogu Xiang before putting your feet up in a hútòng cafe or settling down for a meal in a converted courtyard.

At night, this neighbourhood is the city's most enjoyable place to drink. Bars here are cool rather than brash and are often tucked away in hard-to-find hútông locations. Some of them double as live-music venues where you can catch the latest local bands.

Local Life

- → Food To sample some authentic Běijīng tucker, first check our Běijīng Menu (p95) then head to Yáojì Chǎogān (p93) for some dumplings and pig's liver stew, or to Róng Tiān (p94) for a succulent sheep-spine hotpot.
- → Music See what the city's youth are listening to, and playing, at live-music venues such as Jiāng Hú (p101) or Jiāng Jìn Jǐu (p101).
- → Parks Head to Ditán Park (p88) for a spot of kiteflying, before cooling off with the masses at the outdoor swimming complex in Qīngnián Hú Park (p105).

Getting There & Away

- → **Subway** Lines 8, 2, 6 and 5 all serve this neighbourhood well.
- → **Bus** Bus 107 links the Drum Tower with Dongzhimen Transport Hub. Bus 5 runs south from the Drum Tower, past Běihǎi and Jǐngshān Parks, along the west side of the Forbidden City and on to Qiánmén at the south end of Tiān'ānmén Sq. Bus 113 runs south from Andingmennei Dajie then east to the Workers Stadium and Sānlǐtún.

Lonely Planet's Top Tip

Rent a bike while you're here, or even buy a cheap secondhand one; you can give it away when you leave. Cycling is the best way to see the city, and is especially good for exploring this area's hútòng.
