
Kenmore Square & Fenway

Neighborhood Top Five

- Spending a day at the Museum of Fine Arts (p125), immersing yourself in the Art of the Americas and lunching at the New American Cafe. Dedicate the afternoon to exploring other treasures, especially the Impressionist and post-Impressionist paintings.
- **2** Watching the hometown team whip their opponents at **Fenway Park** (p133).
- 3 Venerating the artistic, aesthetic and cultural legacy of Isabella Stewart Gardner (p127) at her namesake museum.
- 4 Hearing the world-renowned **Boston Symphony Orchestra** (p132) play in the acoustically perfect Symphony Hall.
- Hitting Lansdowne St (p132) for a night of drinking, music and merrymaking.

If you can't score tickets to the baseball game, you can still watch the action and soak up the atmosphere at one of the bars on Lansdowne St (they all definitely have TVs). You can even hear the cheers and the gasps from the fans inside the ballpark.

Explore Kenmore Square & Fenway

Kenmore Sq is the epicenter of student life in Boston. In addition to the Boston University behemoth, there are more than a half-dozen colleges in the area. As such, Kenmore Sq has a disproportionate share of nightlife, inexpensive but nondescript eateries and dormitories disguised as brownstones.

Come to Kenmore Sq to cavort at cool clubs and to devour cheap food. If you get the timing right, you can do so before or after the Red Sox game. Watch the boys battle it out from your perch at one of the local sports bars or, if you're lucky, at Fenway Park

While Kenmore Sq is best for baseball and beer, the southern part of this neighborhood is dedicated to more high-minded pursuits. Dubbed 'Ave of the Arts.' Huntington Ave represents a concentrated area of major and minor artistic and cultural venues, including Symphony Hall, two universities and two museums, Art-lovers should devote a day to exploring one of Boston's celebrated art venues (although deciding which one will be a challenge).

Local Life

- → Cheap Grub Locals know that Peterborough St (p129) is a hub for affordable eating. International eateries and take-out joints line the little residential street, making it a sort of urban food court. This mini restaurant row was destroyed by fire in 2008, but some of the local faves have recently reopened, much to the delight of Fenway residents and regulars.
- **→ Music Scene** Buy tickets in advance to see national acts at the House of Blues (p132), but hang out at Church (p132) any night of the week for a glimpse of the local music scene.

Getting There & Away

→ **Metro** West of the center, the green line of the T forks into four branches, all of which run through Kenmore Sq. So you have to pay attention not only to the color of your train, but also its letter (B, C, D or E). To reach Kenmore Sq or Fenway Park, take any of the green-line trains except the E-line to Kenmore T station. Sights along Huntington Ave in Fenway are accessible from the E-line Museum station or the orange-line Ruggles station.
