

The Heat is On...

And not just on the beaches. Most tourists spend their holidays in a sunkissed Canarian cocoon, blissfully unaware of '*la crisis*' that saw a dramatic downturn in the islands' regional economy caused by the recent global recession. In 2009, the decrease in foreign visitors here equalled a drop of some €1405 million over the previous year (contributing to the massive 40% fall in the overall Spanish loss of revenue from foreign tourism: -€3500 million). On the ground, hotels slashed their room prices, restaurants and shops pulled down the shutters and new construction ground to a shuddering halt.

But it is not all doom and gloom, statistics released in 2011 revealed that the previous year saw a gradual increase in tourism of 4.9%, despite forecasts that had predicted the contrary.

Diversity is the Name of the Game

One result of the economic downturn was a marked commitment by savvy officials to re-define the economic course of the islands and promote projects that were not necessarily tourist-driven. In recent years the Canaries have impressively upped their research and development capabilities in several fields. There are now two universities, an oceanographic institute, several agricultural and marine research centres and the most important astrophysics institute in the world, thanks to the clarity of the islands' skies.

As for tourism, diversity has also been the keyword here as officials demonstrate that, yes, there is life beyond the beach. *Casas rurales* (rural hotels) are sprouting up all over the islands, while activity holidays are also gaining speed. Historic trails are being signposted and mapped and the popularity of watersports, particularly windsurfing and kiteboarding,
