Why Go?

A small island with a desert landscape, Bonaire is not for everyone – but it *is* for divers and snorkelers who want to immerse themselves in that vibrant world under the sea. The beauty of Bonaire is that the coral reef, designated a national park, is just a few feet from the shoreline. Dozens of exceptional dive sites are easily accessible from the shore and teeming with life, making this island an independent diver's (and snorkeler's) paradise.

Above the surface, there is world-class windsurfing on Lac Bay and excellent kayaking among the mangroves. Biking trails wind through the arid hills, while driving routes show off the island's historical and natural sights. Classy but low-key resorts and restaurants complete the picture – perfect for travelers who prefer their adventure with some amenities.

When to Go

Dec-Apr High season, where accommodations fill up and prices are significantly higher.

Jan & Feb Carnival (*Karnaval*) is Bonaire's biggest celebration – a week or more of music and costumes, parades and parties. It culminates the weekend before Ash Wednesday, with the final parade and effigy-burning taking place on the Tuesday.

Sep-Dec Although Bonaire is below the hurricane belt, the island does experience an increase in rain and cooler temperatures.



Bonaire Highlights

- Donaire National Marine Park (p222) Donning a mask and discovering the incredible underwater world that lies right offshore.
- 2 Mangrove Info & Kayak Center (p226) Kayaking and snorkeling in the ecologically rich 'reef nursery.'

- Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire (p221) Keeping the beaches safe for sea turtles – and maybe even ushering some newborn tortuguitas to the safety of the sea.
