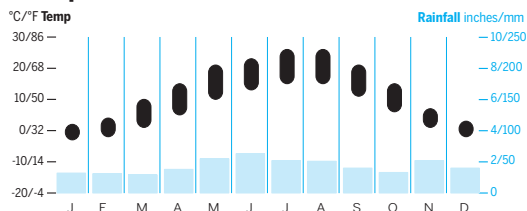

Connections

Hungary lies at the centre of Central Europe and is easy to get to by rail, road or even boat. Rail connections are particularly good to and from Vienna. The Austrian Federal Railway's high-speed Railjet covers the distance between Vienna and Budapest in under three hours and includes a stop in Győr. Rail connections are also good to Bratislava and Prague, with continuing service to popular travel destinations like Berlin and Kraków. Rail connections to other neighbouring states, including Croatia, Serbia and Romania, are less frequent, though they're also reliable with some advance planning. Buses fan out in all directions from Budapest and nearly all corners of the Europe can be reached within 24 hours. Regular hydrofoil service links Budapest to Bratislava and Vienna. Budapest is the country's only practical destination by air but is well served by commercial and budget carriers.

ITINERARIES

One week

Spend at least four days in Budapest, checking out the sights, museums and cafes. On your fifth day take a day trip to a Danube Bend town: see the open-air museum in Szentendre or the cathedral at Esztergom. Day six can be spent getting a morning train to Pécs to see the lovely Turkish remains and check out the many galleries in town. If you've still got the travel bug, on day seven try some local wine in Eger, a baroque town set in red-wine country.

Two weeks

If you're here in summer, make sure you spend some time exploring the towns around Lake Balaton, or just chill out on the beach by the side of this popular lake. Tihany is a rambling hillside village filled with craftsmen's houses set on a peninsula that is a protected nature zone. Keszthely is an old town with a great palace in addition to a beach. Alternatively, head south to Pécs and see more of the Great Plain. Szeged is on the Tisza River, and Kecskemét is further north. Finish your trip in Tokaj, home of Hungary's most famous wine.

Essential Food & Drink

- » **Gulyás** (goulash) Hungary's signature dish, though here it's served more as a soup than a stew and made with beef, onions and tomatoes.
- » **Pörkölt** Paprika-infused stew; closer to what you might imagine when you think of goulash.
- » **Galuska** Small, gnocchi-like dumplings that make a good accompaniment to soak up the sauce in a pörkölt.
- » **Halászlé** Highly recommended fish soup made from poached freshwater fish, tomatoes, green peppers and paprika.
