Natural beauty and license to be outlandish continues to draw free-thinkers and wild parrots into the San Francisco Bay Area, today America's fifth-largest metropolitan region. Psychedelic drugs, newfangled technology, gay liberation, green ventures, free speech and culinary experimentation all became mainstream long ago in the Bay Area.

Never afraid to go for broke, the region has lost fortunes but never its spirit in Gold Rush panics, dot-com crashes and earthquakes. Losing your shirt has become a favorite local pastime, with surfers stripping down right in Santa Cruz parking lots, marchers at San Francisco's Pride Parade and pretty much anyone on hot weekends in clothing-optional Berkeley. This is no place to be shy: out here among eccentrics of every stripe, no one's going to notice a few tan lines.

With its fault lines and free thinkers, the Bay Area keeps only a tentative hold on the planet, not to mention the continental US. Stick around and you'll catch the continental drift, with breezes laced with Pacific salt, perpetually blooming flowers and a tantalizing whiff of unlimited possibility. Breathe in, and brace yourself: other places in California may surprise you, but only in the San Francisco Bay Area will you surprise yourself.

SAN FRANCISCO

Welcome to the bubble, America's most liberal city, where you can say what you like and act like a freak without anyone noticing. 'Eclectic' doesn't begin to describe a town where you can begin your day with a leisurely breakfast of huevos rancheros in the Mission sun, picnic on Italian panini among parrots and poets on North Beach stairway gardens, get goose bumps watching the fog billow over the Golden Gate Bridge from a nude beach, dine Downtown on cuttingedge cuisine inspired by California's cornucopia of produce, and end up still partying at 5am with South of Market (SoMa) clubsters in a universal groove. So long, inhibitions; hello San Francisco.

Once you've ogled Victorians, ridden the cable cars and sailed to Alcatraz, explore the off-the-beaten-path neighborhoods to get a true sense of place. Don't underestimate poet George Sterling's 'cool, gray city of love': a couple of weeks here and you may start shopping for apartments - or at least a pair of chaps.

ORIENTATION

Compact San Francisco sits at the tip of a 30-mile-long peninsula and measures 7 miles by 7 miles. To the west lies the Pacific, to the east San Francisco Bay.

The city can be divided into three sections. Downtown resembles a generous slice of pie, its edges delimited by Van Ness Ave and Market St, with the rounded edge being the waterfront. Major downtown neighborhoods include the Financial District (FiDi), North Beach, Chinatown, Union Square, Nob Hill, Russian Hill and Fisherman's Wharf. To find numbered piers, note that even-numbered piers extend southward of the Ferry Building, and odd-numbered piers northward.

The area south of Market St is aptly called South of Market (SoMa). South of SoMa past Division is the hip, gritty Mission district.

West of Van Ness Ave to the Pacific are historic neighborhoods, including posh Pacific Heights and the Marina, Japantown, the Castro (the city's gay center) and the Haight district (of 1960s fame). Also here are the city's best parks - the Presidio, Lincoln Park and Golden Gate Park.
