Actually, Some People do Walk in LA

'No one walks in LA,' the '80s band Missing Persons famously sang. That was then. Fed up with traffic, smog and high gas prices, the region that defined car culture is developing a foot culture. Angelenos are moving into more densely populated neighborhoods and are walking, cycling and taking public transportation.

You may not need a car during your visit if you stay near one of the arty stations on the Metro Red Line, which connects Union Station in Downtown LA to the San Fernando Valley via Koreatown, Hollywood and Universal Studios. Unlimited-ride passes (\$5 per day, via stored-value TAP cards) are a downright bargain, and given LA's legendary traffic it's often faster to travel below ground than above. Light-rail lines connect Downtown with Long Beach, Pasadena and East LA. A Culver City line was due to open as we went to press, to be extended to Santa Monica by 2015.

In 2011, the city of Los Angeles authorized construction of an eventual 1,680 miles of bikeways, in addition to those in other cities around the county. Bicycles are permitted on Metro trains and buses are fitted with bike racks.

While eventual plans call for a 'Subway to the Sea' in Santa Monica, for now you'll be busing, biking or – gasp! – driving to Mid-City, Beverly Hills and the beaches.

GRAUMAN'S CHINESE THEATRE

Yes, every other tourist goes there too, but even the most jaded may thrill to matching hand- or footprints with those of the stars, enshrined forever in concrete in front of Grauman's Chinese Theatre in Hollywood (p353).

Top Five LA Beaches

- » **EI Matador** (off Map p388) Hideaway hemmed by battered rock cliffs and strewn with giant boulders. Wild surf; not suitable for children.
- » **Zuma** (p360) Gorgeous 2-mile ribbon of sand for swimming, body surfing and tight bodies.
- » Malibu Lagoon/Surfrider (p360) Legendary surf beach with superb swells and a lagoon for bird-watching.
- » **Santa Monica** (p361) Families escape inland heat on this extra-wide beach, home to the Santa Monica Pier and South Bay Bicycle Trail (p367).
- » **Venice** (p362) provides a nonstop parade of friends and freaks. Drum circle in the sand on Sundays.



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
