## Why Go?

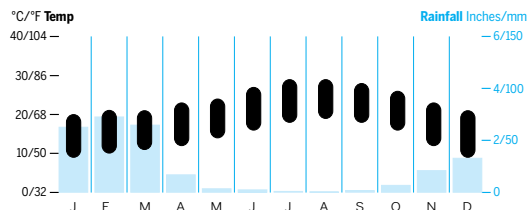
Chances are that Orange County, that stretch between Los Angeles and San Diego, has seeped into your consciousness even if you've never been here.

## Theme-Park Passes

Visiting a lot of SoCal theme parks? The **Southern California CityPass** ([www.citypass.com/southern-california](http://www.citypass.com/southern-california); adult/child 3-9yr from \$328/284) covers three-day 'Park Hopper' admission to Disneyland Resort, plus one-day admission to SeaWorld San Diego (p633) and Universal Studios Hollywood (p567). The CityPass price is at least \$100 less than the combined regular ticket prices. Otherwise, look online for specials (eg five-day Park Hopper passes for the three-day price) or seasonal discounts on annual passports for Southern California residents and their guests.

## FEELING THE HEAT AT DISNEYLAND

When Walt Disney opened Disneyland on July 17, 1955, he declared it the 'Happiest Place on Earth.' However, its opening day was a disaster. Temperatures over 100°F (38°C) melted asphalt underfoot, leaving women's high heels stuck in the tar. There were plumbing problems: all of the drinking fountains quit working. Hollywood stars didn't show up on time, and more than twice the number of expected guests – some 28,000 by day's end – crowded through the gates, some holding counterfeit tickets. None of this kept eager Disney fans away for long; more than 50 million tourists visited in its first decade alone. Nowadays, more than 14 million kids, grandparents, honeymooners and international tourists come to Walt's playground every year.

## Disneyland To-Do List

- Make hotel reservations or book a Disneyland package.
- Sign up online for Disney Fans Insider e-newsletters and resort updates.
- Check the parks' opening hours and live show and entertainment schedules online.
- Make dining reservations for sit-down restaurants or special meals with Disney characters.
- Buy print-at-home tickets and passes online.
- Recheck the park opening hours and Anaheim Resort Transportation (ART) or hotel-shuttle schedules.
- Pack a small day pack with sunscreen, hat, sunglasses, swimwear, change of clothes, jacket or hoodie, lightweight plastic rain poncho, and extra batteries and memory cards for digital and video cameras.
- Fully charge your electronic devices, including cameras and phones.
- Download a Disneyland app to your smartphone.
