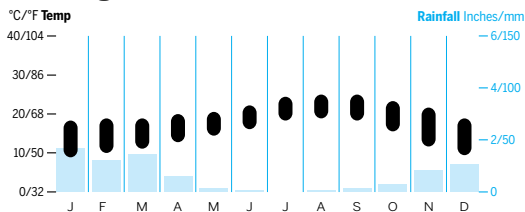

When to Go

Jun–Aug High season. Temperatures and hotel rates are highest.

Sep–Oct, Mar–May Shoulder seasons; moderate rates.

MISSION SAN DIEGO DE ALCALÁ

Although the first California mission was on Presidio Hill by present-day Old Town, in 1774 Padre Junípero Serra moved it about 7 miles upriver, closer to water and more arable land. Now the Mission Basilica San Diego de Alcalá (p432) has been lovingly restored into a pretty white church and ancillary buildings (including California's oldest) and welcomes visitors.

Balboa Park

San Diego's best-known attraction, the zoo, is ensconced in Balboa Park, one of America's great urban spaces. Balboa Park rose to fame with a world's fair about 100 years ago, the Panama-California Exposition of 1915-16. Grand Spanish-colonial revival-style pavilions were constructed, which dominated the California design sense for generations. Here's the thing, though: they were temporary, made largely of stucco, chicken wire, plaster, hemp and horsehair like Hollywood movie sets, but they proved so popular that many were later replaced with the durable concrete structures that you see today. And among the park's many stages and amphitheatres, the jewel is the 600-seat Old Globe, modeled after the London theater where Shakespeare's works were performed. At 1200 acres, Balboa Park is more than 50% bigger than Central Park in New York City (778 acres).

GAY & LESBIAN SAN DIEGO

Historians trace the roots of San Diego's thriving gay community to WWII. Amid the enforced intimacy of military life, gay men from around the US were suddenly able to create strong if clandestine social networks. Post-war, many of these new friends stayed, and by the late 1960s, a newly politicized gay community made its unofficial headquarters in the Hillcrest neighborhood, which still has the highest concentration of LGBT bars, restaurants, cafes and shops, though the center is gradually branching out to other neighborhoods including nearby North Park. Visitors and locals alike find San Diego's gay scene generally more casual and friendly than in San Francisco or LA.

San Diego County's Best Water-View Dining

- Anthony's Fish Grotto (p443) Seafood classic next to the great naval ships of the Embarcadero, by Downtown San Diego's seashore.
- Bali Hai (p443) Tiki to the max, baby; watch the sailboats go by off Point Loma.
- World Famous (p444) This spot in Pacific Beach has never given up the surfer vibe.
- George's at the Cove (p453) Consistently rated one of America's top restaurants, with three venues for your dining pleasure. The rooftop lounge has awesome views.
- Jake's Del Mar (p456) After a day at the races, stop for a cocktail and an awesome happy hour.
