## Why Go?


Boyacá, Santander and Norte de Santander together form one of the first areas settled by Spanish conquistadores, many of whose colonial towns still stand today, and its calling as Colombia's heartland cannot be understated. It's here that the seeds of revolution were sowed, culminating in victory at Puente de Boyacá that ultimately led to Colombia's independence.

Amid its deep gorges, fast-flowing rivers and soaring, snowcapped mountains, adventurers can choose between white-water rafting and paragliding in San Gil, mountain biking and horseback riding in Villa de Leyva, or trekking through the glacial peaks of Parque Nacional Natural (PNN) El Cocuy. Those less audacious can bliss out around Lago de Tota, Colombia's largest lake, shop for pottery in Ráquira or hit the fashionable clubs of Bucaramanga.

It all culminates in the perfectly preserved town of Barichara, a cinematic, cobblestoned village of stone churches and uniform architecture that evokes life inside a painting.

## When to Go


### Bucaramanga



**Jan** The driest, clearest days on El Cocuy, one of Colombia's coveted trekking peaks.

**Feb & Mar** The pre-Semana Santa (Holy Week) season has less crowds and full-bloom parks.

**Dec** Like elsewhere in Colombia, a festival of lights illuminates the region's charming villages.
