Why Go?


With one foot on either side of the continental divide and behemoths of granite in every direction, Colorado's Northern Mountains allow visitors a glimpse of the top of the world.

With some of the state's most dramatic alpine environments, the northern Rockies make an irresistible call to mountain-lovers, regardless of whether the season calls for mounting them in hiking boots or shushing down on a pair of skis. This is where you come to ski if you'd rather skip the Aspen attitude, go backcountry skiing or just get out on a pair of snowshoes.

In the spring, summer and autumn, hiking and biking in state and national parks and forests continue to draw visitors. Many of the ski resorts transform into groomed mountain-biking areas, and campers make for high-altitude lakes. There's also top-notch fishing, rafting and kayaking, weathered ghost towns, horseback riding, camping and touring the mountains until well after autumn turns the aspens to gold.

When to Go?

Estes Park




June-September Sunshine, perfect hiking and monstrous thunderheads attract visitors. September— October Temperatures drop and the tourists vacate. The aspens turn golden. **November–May** Crisp air and tons of snowfall bring skiers to low-key resort areas.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN NATIONAL PARK

Though Rocky Mountain National Park doesn't rank among the largest national parks in the USA (it's *only* 265,000 acres), it's rightly among one of the most popular, hosting 3 million visitors every year.

This is a place of natural spectacle on every scale: from hulking granite formations – many taller than 12,000ft, some over 130 million years old – to the delicate yellow burst of the glacier lily, one of the dozen alpine wildflowers that explode in a short, colorful life at the edge of receding snow-fields for a few days every spring.
