It has more Blue Flag beaches than practically anywhere, as well as a higher proportion of second homes. Coastal communities are changing, towns are gentrifying, and not everywhere is sharing in the spoils. Will this all change post-Brexit? Only time will tell.

House Prices & Second Homes

Spiralling house prices and the ever-increasing number of second homes and retirement apartments continue to be thorny topics. With the average house price now more than 10 times the average wage in Cornwall and Devon, this region is officially one of the UK's most unaffordable areas, especially for young people and firsttime buyers in picturesque places such as Salcombe, St Mawes, Perranporth, Padstow, Fowey and Falmouth. Cornwall and Devon also top the league for the number of holiday homes (50,000-plus, and growing), but the debate rumbles on about how much these homes-awayfrom-home actually contribute to the local economy. One solution is to let locals decide: a recent vote in St Ives to limit new-build homes to residents working locally met with widespread approval, and may point the way forward in years to come.

Fine Food & Sustainable Fish

Food and drink continue to be major growth areas. From Michelin-starred restaurants to microbreweries, coffee-roasters to chocolate makers, vineyards to gin distilleries and street-food vans to food-box schemes, the southwest's producers are leading the way when it comes to culinary innovation – and, in a world where local sourcing and seasonal ingredients are becoming ever more important, that's a really positive sign. Similarly, the southwest's fisheries are pioneering more sustainable fishing practices – since 2012, the 90-sq-mile Lyme Bay Fisheries and Conservation Reserve has enabled conservationists to work with fishers to preserve fish stocks and ensure the health of the marine environment.
