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Why Go?



From the Masai Mara to Tsavo, this is a country of vivid experiences – elephant families wallowing in swamps in the shadow of Mt Kilimanjaro, the massed millions of pink flamingos bathing elegantly in lake shallows, the landscape suddenly fallen silent and brought to attention by the arrival of an as-yet-unseen predator. There's nowhere better than Kenya to answer Africa's call to the wild.

When to Go

Nairobi



Jul-Oct The annual wildebeest migration arrives in the Masai Mara in all its epic glory.

Jan-Feb Hot, dry weather with high concentrations of wildlife in the major parks. Nov-Mar Migratory birds present in their millions throughout the country.

Itineraries

One Week Safari njema – have a good trip! Kenya's roughand-ready capital, Nairobi, is where you begin; it's the only capital city with a national park on its doorstep – watch lions, leopards and cheetahs against the backdrop of distant skyscrapers. This is just a taster for the next stop, the worldrenowned Masai Mara National Reserve. Between July and October, the Mara hosts the annual wildebeest migration, an iconic slice of safari Africa and one of the greatest wildlife concentrations on earth.

Staying in Maasailand, head to Amboseli National Park, where you can get closer to elephants than almost anywhere else in Africa. The views of Mt Kilimanjaro, Africa's highest peak, are without rival.

Three Weeks Start your search for the 'Big Five' – elephant, lion, leopard, rhino and buffalo – at Lake Nakuru National Park, a stunning alkaline lake in the Rift Valley. Its population of many thousands of pink flamingos and pelicans is one of Kenya's signature images. This vitally important national park also protects the country's largest population of endangered black rhinos, as well as large herds of buffalo; sightings are almost guaranteed.

From Lake Nakuru, your next stop is the obligatory safari in Masai Mara National Reserve.

TRANSPORT IN KENYA

Kenya has a reasonably extensive and well-developed transport network. Things to remember:

- » Transport options and road quality are excellent in central and western Kenya and along the coast, but take what you can get (and be prepared to shake and rattle) in the north.
- » You'll need a private vehicle (usually a 4WD) for most safaris inside national parks.
- » Distances in Kenya can be considerable and travel times invariably longer than you expect; consider flying to make the most of your time.
- » If you decide to travel by train, do so to experience a colonial-era relic rather than to arrive comfortably or quickly or in any great comfort.
- » If you're travelling by land, never do so by night.
- » If travelling on a matatu, *never* sit next to the driver if you value your life.

Cultural Tips

- » Linger over greetings; they play an important societal role.
- » Learn a few words in Swahili.
- » Don't eat or pass things with the left hand.
- » If asked for a bribe, ask for ID from the official in question and a receipt.
