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Townsville to Innisfail

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
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Why Go?

In between the tourist magnets of Cairns to the north and Airlie Beach to the south, Townsville is a real, living, breathing city with a pulse. Yet although North Queensland's largest urban centre is often bypassed by visitors, it has a surprising number of attractions of its own: a palm-lined beachfront promenade, gracious 19th-century architecture and a host of cultural and sporting venues and events. And Magnetic Island's national park, walking trails and wildlife are just offshore.

To the north of Townsville, through cane fields and laidback tropical coastline known as the Cassowary Coast, Cyclone Yasi carved a path of destruction in February 2011, mainly around Mission Beach, Tully and Cardwell. However, most services, attractions and national parks should be open by the time you read this. Charters Towers and Ravenswood, inland to the southwest, offer an accessible slice of the dusty outback, while boats make the short crossing to forested Hinchinbrook and Dunk Islands.
