The Big Wet Continues

Much of Australia was wracked by drought for the first decade of this century, a period tragically defined by the apocalyptic 2009 'Black Saturday' bushfires in Victoria. But this all ended in 2011 with record rainfalls across New South Wales and Queensland. These rains were followed by category-five Cyclone Yasi, which dumped further rain across Queensland.

The drought was over, but flood waters inundated dozens of towns, affecting 1 million sq km (roughly the size of France and Germany combined). The Brisbane River broke its banks, flooding vast stretches of Australia's third-largest city. Flooding also hit Victoria, with crops devastated and thousands of livestock drowned. Coal production was affected, crop and livestock losses mounted and tourism took a big hit – costing the nation \$5.6 billion.

Then, in early 2013, southeast Queensland suffered another blow, this time from the tail end of Tropical Cyclone Oswald, which immersed Bundaberg and parts of Brisbane in river water. Residents of low-lying suburbs wrung themselves dry and started rebuilding (again...).

Later in 2013, savage bushfires in the Blue Mountains behind Sydney blazed for weeks, part of an outbreak of more than 100 fires across NSW that burned out almost 300,000 acres of forest and destroyed around 250 homes.

Meanwhile, Out on the Reef

For many climatologists these natural disasters are just part of the growing pattern of human-induced climate change wreaking havoc on Australia's weather.

Climate change remains a hot topic along the East Coast (no pun intended) – particularly when it comes to Queensland's biggest tourist attraction, the Great Barrier Reef. Marine researchers predict disastrous
