In Australia, the east coast is most definitely where it's at.

The Reef in Strife

Climate change remains a hot topic (no pun intended) along the east coast, particularly when it comes to Queensland's biggest tourist attraction, the Great Barrier Reef. In 2016 unusually elevated sea temperatures caused a disastrous 'bleaching' event, where sensitive corals failed to cope with the warmer environment and perished en masse. A second bleaching in 2017 struck at the worst time, before the coral had recovered. Similar bleaching events happened in 1998 and 2002, but never to this extent: over 50% of the reef has been affected, and parts of it may be beyond recovery.

If climate change continues at present rates and such bleaching events become more regular – especially in conjunction with the added threats of wave damage from more frequent cyclones, the continued scourge of the coral-eating crown-of-thorns starfish, and environmentally menacing port-expansion and dredging activities planned along the Queensland coast – some estimates suggest the reef's near-total devastation within the next 50 years. This destruction is unthinkable on many fronts, not least of which are the catastrophic economic consequences: the reef generates an estimated \$4 billion in annual tourism revenue for Australia.

Stability & Desirability

Australia has done comparatively well on the economic front of late. This commodities-powered nation was one of the only Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) nations to avoid recession during the 2008 Global Financial Crisis (GFC). Unemployment was expected to reach 8% to 10% during the GFC but didn't hit 6%. But when the economy in China (one of Australia's key export markets) stalled, the mining boom that kept Australia afloat during the GFC came to a screeching halt. A
