Accommodation

Europe offers the fullest possible range of budget accommodation, from camping grounds, hostels and student dormitories to private rooms, guesthouses and cheap hotels. Plus there are more novel options, such as farm stays and couch surfing. In this guide we've listed reviews in order of author preference.

Unless otherwise stated in individual reviews or in country directories, all prices for hotels and hostels in this book include a private bathroom and do not include breakfast.

Categories

Accommodation options in this book generally range from no stars to three stars, with the occasional smarter four- or five-star 'splurge' option. The very cheapest options are dorms or hostels with shared bathrooms and toilets, while at the upper end there are boutique or luxury hotels and self-contained accommodation with en suite facilities, TV and free wi-fi.

Price Icons

Each sleeping option has an indicative price category (from € to €€€) – these correspond to the price of the room relative to that country's price breakdown. See each chapter's Directory for more information.

Reservations

During peak holiday periods, particularly Easter, summer and Christmas – and any time of year in popular destinations such as London, Paris and Rome – it's wise to book ahead. Most places can be reserved online.

Seasons

Rates are for high season and often drop outside high season by as much as 50%.

High season in ski resorts is usually between Christmas and New Year and around the February–March winter holidays.

B&Bs & Guesthouses

Guesthouses (pension, gasthaus, chambre d'hôte etc) and B&Bs (bed and breakfasts) offer greater comfort than hostels for a marginally higher price. Most are simple affairs, normally with shared bathrooms.

In private rooms with a local family, or in a small guesthouse, you benefit from greater contact with locals. You'll still have privacy and autonomy, but remember you won't be able to bring the party back to your place.

In some destinations, particularly in eastern Europe, locals wait in train stations touting rented rooms. Just be sure such accommodation isn't in a far-flung suburb that requires an expensive taxi ride to and from town. Check that both parties are clear on price beforehand and remember that it's unwise to leave valuables in your room when you go out.

B&Bs in the UK and Ireland often aren't really budget accommodation – even the lowliest tend to have midrange prices and there is a new generation of 'designer' B&Bs which are positively top end.

Camping

Camping is the cheapest option. It has been rediscovered of late by trendsetters in western Europe, such as the UK (albeit with designer tents, ecotents and Airstream caravans; for example, www.coolcamping.co.uk). In other countries, such as the Czech Republic, Germany, the Netherlands and Poland, it never went out of fashion.
