## When to Go

The world's most famous steeplechase, the Aintree Grand National, is run just outside Liverpool over the first weekend in April, while May and June are Tourist Trophy (TT) Festival season on the Isle of Man – beloved of motor enthusiasts the world over. The football (soccer) season runs from late August until May.

In the arts, the highlight is the Manchester International Festival, a biennial showstopper held in July. Music buffs should visit Liverpool in the last week of August for madness at Creamfields dance-fest and the Mathew St Festival, an ode to all things Beatles.
