
Why Go?

Black beaches stretch along the Atlantic, geysers spout from geothermal fields and waterfalls glide across escarpments while brooding volcanoes and glittering ice caps score the inland horizon. The beautiful Southwest has many of Iceland's most legendary natural wonders, so it's a relatively crowded and increasingly developed area. The Golden Circle (a tourist route comprising three famous sights: Pingvellir, Geysir and Gullfoss) draws by far the largest crowds outside of Reykjavík, but visit during off-hours or venture further afield and you'll find awe-inspiring splendour.

The further you go the better it gets. Tourist faves such as the silica-filled Blue Lagoon and the rift valley and ancient parliament at Pingvellir are just beyond the capital. Churning seas lead to the Vestmannaeyjar archipelago offshore. At the region's far reaches lie the powerful Hekla and Eyjafjallajökull volcanoes, busy Skógar and Vík, and the hidden valleys of Pórsmörk and Landmannalaugar.

REYKJANES PENINSULA

The Revkianes Peninsula expands in drama as you move away from the highway between Reykjavík and Keflavík International Airport, You'll find not only the Blue Lagoon, Iceland's most famous attraction, but numerous other gorgeous and interesting sights, many of them based around active volcanoes. The busiest towns are no-frills Keflavík and nearby Njarðvík, but the sweet, windswept fishing hamlets of Garður and Sandgerði - great for whale watching - are just minutes to the west of the airport on a small northwestern spur. The rest of the Revkianes, from dramatic Reykjanestá in the southwest to the Reykianesfólkvangur wilderness reserve in the east, is an untamed landscape of multihued volcanic craters, mineral lakes, bubbling hot springs, rugged mountains and coastal lava fields.

The Reykjanes Peninsula is a Unesco Global Geopark (www.reykjanesgeopark. is), formed to research and protect the region's unusual geology (pillow lava! oceanic ridge! meeting of tectonic plates! four volcanic systems!) and local culture.

Getting There & Away

Public transport to Keflavík and the Blue Lagoon is fast and frequent from Revkiavík, There is limited public bus service to other villages, but you'll do best with private transport to reach the more remote parts of the peninsula.
