Cementing Democracy

Depending on how you look at it, Kenya's democracy is either extremely robust or in a permanent state of peril. After the horrendous violence that followed the disputed elections of 2007 – violence that resulted in 1000 deaths, 600,000 Kenyans displaced from their homes and six senior Kenyan public figures forced to appear before the International Criminal Court – the country is holding its breath in advance of the 2012 poll. The surprising stability with which the government of erstwhile foes President Mwai Kibaki (who will be standing down after two terms) and Prime Minister Raila Odinga (a leading candidate for the presidency) has ruled Kenya (since being forced into a marriage of convenience) has restored considerable faith in the country's democratic institutions. Cynicism, however, remains high among ordinary Kenyans when it comes to their political class. More than that, the underlying suspicions between various tribal groupings, poverty, and the increasing competition for scarce resources, which lay behind the

violence, remain unresolved.

Kenya's economy is booming, and neither natural disasters, post-election violence or war with Somalia can shake the country's confidence that Kenya is on the up. There's just one problem: only a small percentage of Kenyans see the benefits of the growing prosperity. Unemployment sits at around 40%, a staggering 50% of Kenyans live below the poverty line and the prices of basic foodstuffs are soaring. By one estimate, Kenya would require an annual growth rate of 11% for the prosperity gains to even begin to trickle down to poorer sectors of Kenyan society. Although Kenya has shown some gains in recent years, the Human Development
