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## Why Go?

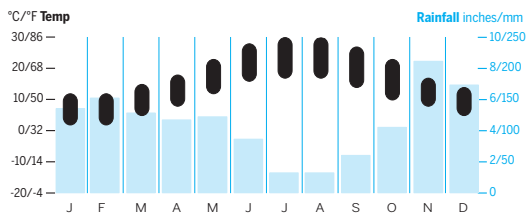

August sees quiet seaside spots morph into loud discaladen towns where every day is a thumping weekend. Head north and you might spot locals in traditional dress, sworn virgins and shepherds guiding flocks in the otherwise inhospitable mountains.

Albania is unforgettable: donkeys tethered to concrete bunkers, houses crawling up each other to reach the hilltops in Berat and Gjirokastra, and isolated beaches.
