Explore Lower Manhattan & the Financial District

A little planning will save you a lot of time in Lower Manhattan. Book tickets online to the unmissable Ellis Island and Statue of Liberty, or catch the first ferry and avoid weekends, especially in summer. You'll need a good four hours to explore the two sights properly, and bring a picnic lunch - the food on-site is awful. You'll also need to book online to visit the 9/11 Memorial at the World Trade Center site. To experience the Financial District's power-broking intensity, head in during business hours, but, to calmly contemplate the area's Federal homes, Greek Revival temples and early modern skyscrapers, go after hours. To avoid the hordes at shopping mecca Century 21, raid the racks by 8am on weekdays. A good time for foodies is Sunday afternoon, with fantastic local produce at the seasonal New Amsterdam Market and free wine tastings at Pasanella & Son. If the weather is on your side, stock the hamper here and walk across the Brooklyn Bridge for a panoramic picnic. For an evening buzz, head to Tribeca's booty of fashionable bars and restaurants, the latter best booked ahead.

Local Life

- → Markets Graze and shop with locavores at the gutrumbling New Amsterdam Market (p73).
- → Coffee Ditch the chains for in-the-know Kaffe 1668 (p75) and La Colombe (p75).
- → Wine Swill free vino on Sunday afternoons at Pasanella & Son (p78).
- → Culture Catch encore-inducing drama at the Flea Theater (p77).

Getting There & Away

- → **Subwav** The Financial District is well serviced by subway lines, connecting the area to the rest of Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens and the Bronx. Fulton St is the main interchange station, servicing the A/C, J/M/Z, 2/3 and 4/5 lines. Line 1 terminates at South Ferry, from where the Staten Island Ferry departs.
- → Bus From the Staten Island Ferry terminal, useful routes include the 15 (to East Village, Midtown East and Upper East Side) and the 20 (to Tribeca, West Village, Chelsea and Midtown West).
- → **Boat** The Staten Island Ferry Terminal is at the southern end of Whitehall St. Ferries to Governors Island leave from the adjacent Battery Maritime Building. Services to Liberty and Ellis Islands depart from nearby Battery Park.

Lonely Planet's Top Tip

If you're after cut-price tickets to Broadway shows, ditch the main TKTS Booth in Times Sq for the TKTS branch at South Street Seaport (p392). Oueues usually move a little faster and you can also purchase tickets for next-day matinees (something you can't do at the Times Sq outlet). Smartphone users can download the free TKTS app, which offers real-time listings of what's on sale.


