

The Italian artist Leonardo Da Vinci created this masterpiece over 500 years ago and brought it with him to France. Recent studies show that there are three different versions painted under the one that can be seen today. One version has her hands clutching the arms of the chair instead of in



It took Da Vinci several years to make *Mona Lisa*. He used hair-thin layers of oil paint and glaze to create the smooth, misty effect that hides any brush strokes. The painting was brighter – it has yellowed over time.

MONA GOES MISSING

One night in 1911, after finishing work at the Louvre, Vincenzo Peruggia pulled Mona Lisa out of her frame and took her home! That was the last anyone saw of Mona for years. The crime remained unsolved until Peruggia was caught trying to sell her to a gallery in Italy. After that the work was guarded carefully.

Attention seeker

Opposite the Mona Lisa, which is simple and small, hangs the massive and very busy painting called Wedding at Cana by Paolo Veronese. Measuring 6.8 x 9.9m (22 x 33ft), it's the biggest painting in the Louvre.
