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Why Go?

Like an oyster, Bahrain has a rough exterior that takes some prising open, but it's always worth the effort. Manama may lack the finesse of other Gulf capitals, but that's key to its appeal. The storied location of ancient Dilmun and the epicentre of the Gulf's pearling past – Bahrain has a history to reflect on with pride. There's even a cheeky claim that it was home to the Garden of Eden. Nowadays the country has its own Formula 1 Grand Prix, a growing art and foodie scene frequented by Manama's sizeable expat population, and all the hallmarks of wealth, modern Arabian-style. Bahrain's confidence may have been shaken by the uncertain aftermath of the Arab Spring, but its appeal endures, and the lack of visitors means you may have it all to yourself.

Daily Costs

Bahrain is an expensive destination, not least because budget accommodation is not recommended for Western visitors. Expect to pay at least US\$100 for a comfortable room. Cheaper eating options are easier to find (starting from US\$5), and with free access to many of the main sites of interest, a minimum daily cost with transport comes to around US\$140. This rises to US\$200 if you're staying in midrange hotels; for a top-end hotel with car hire, a starting point of US\$350 is nearer the mark.

ITINERARIES

One Day

Enjoy the juxtaposition of ancient and modern at the **Bahrain National Museum** and the adjacent Bahrain National Theatre, before wandering around the real thing in the wind-tower residences of neighbouring **Muhar**-**raq**. Explore the giant **AI Fatih Mosque**, then stop for lunch at **Coco's** and a pastry at **Café Lilou** over in chic Adliya. Shop for perfumes, ice cream and gold in **Manama Soug** before having dinner at **Haji Gahwa**.

Three Days

After allowing day one for Manama, spend day two with the dead at **Bahrain Fort** and **Sar**. Admire the continuity with the ancient in the crafts of **AI Jasra**, wonder whether this is paradise at the **Tree of Life**, and complete the burial circuit at **A'Ali** for sunset. On day three, visit the **Oil Museum**, pump up the pace with a trip to the **Formula 1 Racetrack**, then slow things down at nearby **AI Areen Wildlife Park & Reserve**. If one of the days is Friday, make sure you're in Manama for a famous Bahrain brunch.

Essential Food & Drink

Makbous Rice and spices with chicken, lamb or fish in a rich sauce.

Rangena Coconut cake.

• **Khabees** Dates in a variety of sizes, colours and states of ripeness.

• **Tap water** Safe to drink, although most people stick to bottled water.

Alcohol Widely available, with some excellent hotel cocktail bars.
