

A Chaotic Political Atmosphere

- Politics is a topsy-turvy affair in Papua New Guinea, with a parliament often mired in dysfunction. This is perhaps not surprising, given the nation's bewildering political complexities where 109 MPs representing 820 languages regularly cross the floor to vote with the opposition, often showing little or no allegiance to their political party. As a consequence, since 1975 (when PNG became independent) only one prime minister has served a full five-year term without being brought down in a no-confidence vote. Survival, not policy, tends to be the focus of PNG politics.
- The chaotic political scene sometimes takes a turn for the absurd, as happened in late 2011, when two men each claimed to be the legitimate prime minister. The problems began when Prime Minister Michael Somare took leave from the country in 2011 to receive medical care abroad and remained away for nearly five months. During his absence, MPs officially removed Somare from his post and installed Peter O'Neill as prime minister.

Mutiny!

When Somare returned to PNG, he tried to reclaim his position, which led to a ruling by the Supreme Court in his favour. O'Neill and MPs refused to recognise the court order, resulting in deadlock until January 2012, when 'a mutiny' was carried out. Soldiers loyal to Somare seized key military barracks and placed military chief Brigadier-General Francis Agwi under house arrest. The whole affair greatly discredited Somare in the eyes of many Papuans, who felt that after his 43 years in parliament, 18 as prime minister, it was time to move on.
