Scandals

Known by acronyms like DAP or single-word appellations like Nopales or Malampaya, political-corruption scandals are to the Philippines what football is to Brazilians – a lens through which to interpret the national character. Even while former president Arroyo (and current Congressional representative) is under 'hospital arrest' awaiting a resolution of charges of plunder, talk of impeaching President Aquino was bandied about in the summer of 2014. A flurry of accusations surrounding the Disbursement Acceleration Program (DAP) – essentially a way for Aquino to bypass the legislature and, according to him, fast track a much needed stimulus package – was coming to a head. In a discouraging tit-for-tat Aquino threatened to impeach the Supreme Court justices who ruled DAP unconstitutional.

Before DAP, confidence in Aquino had already diminished thanks to a series of high-profile events including the Zamboanga siege; attack on farm workers at Hacienda Lucita; the Luneta hostage taking; the handling of relief operations after the Bohol earthquake and Typhoon Haiyan (known locally as Typhoon Yolanda); cuts in social services; and a failure to meet expectations in improving transportation and power infrastructure. Aquino is not the only figure embroiled in scandals, however. The ongoing Nopales investigation, in which an influential businesswoman is accused of channeling kickbacks to prominent opposition leaders, is a smorgasbord of wrongdoing.
