Why Go?

West is best – at least as far as those quintessential snapshots of Puerto Rico go. Here the azure ocean assumes a visceral palpability because this is the place to get in it: paddling to catch a ride on one perfect wave after another, or swimming off sandy strands that regularly grace 'world's best beach' lists.

The region's pièce de résistance is Rincón, a surfin' safari outpost (named in a Beach Boys song, for goodness' sake!) where beach bums catch waves in the salty dawn, then fuel up in the area's eclectic eateries or mingle around beach bonfires. Meanwhile in its set-piece wilderness, Refugio Nacional Cabo Rojo, every ounce of this land's seaside seductiveness – its stormy shorelines, beguiling beaches and down-to-earth coastal villages – gets showcased.


Bite down on a conch fritter and prepare to brave the waves, bask in the sunsets and absorb the mellow spirit of slacker independence.

When to Go

Welcome to the endless summer: the west coast is pleasantly hot all year round. It gets heavy rain in late summer and early fall, but otherwise, expect it to be sunny, breezy and around 80°F nearly every day.

If you're here to surf, winter is an ideal time to visit, although surfing competitions kick off from mid-October. Around this time cold fronts bring big waves to the western beaches, when average crests of 5ft or 6ft can grow as large as 25ft. In December and February, you may also spot migrating whales offshore.

Those who aren't here to ride the waves will find the calmer waters more inviting for swimming and deep-sea fishing in summer.



Rincón & West Coast Highlights

- Rincón (p173) Surf beside beach bums and vacationing businessmen on the legendary breaks here.

History

The consensus is that Columbus first arrived in Puerto Rico in November 1493 and docked somewhere off the west coast (though there is some dispute as to actually *where*). Fifteen years later he was followed by Juan Ponce

de León, who landed near Cabo Rojo before heading off east to found the settlement of Caparra close to San Juan. San Germán, the island's second-oldest city, was founded near Mayagüez in 1511, and moved to its present site in 1573.
