And the very relationship with the giant to the north shows no signs of being resolved any time soon.

## A Question of Status

A commonwealth of the United States of America, Puerto Rico is a semi-autonomous territory whose constitutional status has long been a political oxymoron. Puerto Ricans enjoy many protections and benefits that US citizens have, but they are not allowed to participate in federal elections and have only a nonvoting 'Resident Commissioner' in the US House of Representatives.

A non-binding resolution in 2012 showed that the majority of the island's voters favor US statehood. President Obama committed to funding an 'official' referendum that would decide Puerto Rico's political fate, and set aside \$2.5 million for this purpose (although no date was specified).

The question remains, particularly under Donald Trump's presidency, whether any Puerto Rican vote favoring statehood could be linked to a mandated admission process to the US as the 51st state. President Trump's views on this, and relationship with the island, have so far seemed nuanced to say the least. But on becoming Puerto Rico's 12th Governor in 2017, pro-statehood Ricky Rosselló succeeded in getting Senate to pass a bill paving the way for the first 'statehood or independence' vote in Puerto Rico's history, set for June 11, 2017.

### **Environmentalism & Energy**

Energy issues have long sparked debate among Puerto Ricans, whose energy costs outweigh those of their US neighbors (electricity costs are virtually double the US average) despite them having, on average, half the salaries to pay for them with. The island's ailing electricity grid was responsible for an island-wide three-night blackout in September 2016.

As the island has no petroleum, gas or coal reserves, and these three currently account for 98% of its electricity generation, it's easy to see where the problem lies. Solar
