
# Why Go?

# Connections

Trains and buses link Norway with Russia, Sweden and Finland. Frequent ferries head to Germany and Denmark from several Norwegian ports. Airports in Oslo and Bergen connect Norway to the world, with a handful of international flights to Stavanger, Trondheim and distant Tromsø, way up in the Arctic Circle.

## ITINERARIES

#### **One Week**

Spend a day in Oslo, then take the Norway in a Nutshell tour to Bergen via Myrdal, Flåm and Nærøyfjorden. Spend two nights in Bergen before taking an unhurried jaunt around Hardangerfjord. Return to Sognefjord, stay at the Stalheim Hotel and visit glaciers around Fjærland. Return to Oslo.

#### **Two Weeks**

Instead of returning to Oslo, head back to Bergen and take the *Hurtigruten* along the coast, pausing for stays of a night or two in Ålesund and Trondheim. Continue to the fishing villages of the craggy Lofoten Islands, where you should spend at least a couple of days exploring. Finally, take the *Hurtigruten* to Tromsø, the north's most vibrant city, before returning to Oslo.

#### **One Month**

Tromsø is your gateway to Norway's High Arctic. After a night in this engaging town, make for the prehistoric paintings of Alta, the area around Nordkapp, the activities of Kirkenes and, depending on the season, dog sledding or hiking around the Sámi capital of Karasjok. At journey's end, allow a week in Svalbard, taking in as many activities and excursions as you can.

# **Essential Food & Drink**

» Reindeer Grilled or roasted, Scandinavia's iconic species is also its tastiest red meat; you'll find it on menus from Oslo to Svalbard.

» **Elk** Call it what you like (many prefer moose), but this tasty meat usually appears as steaks or burgers.

» **Salmon** World-renowned Norwegian salmon is so popular that you'll eat it for dinner (grilled) or breakfast (smoked).

» Arctic char The world's northernmost freshwater fish is a star of northern Norway's seafood-rich menus.

» Arctic menu A popular scheme (www.arktiskmeny.no) in northern Norway that encourages restaurants to use natural local ingredients.

**» Fish markets** Often the best (and cheapest) places to eat along the Norwegian coast, with the freshest seafood at fresh-off-the-boat prices.
