

# **Renewable Energy**

The Scottish National Party (SNP), which had led a minority government in Edinburgh since 2007, surprised the nation in the 2011 elections with a landslide victory to the Scottish parliament, winning 69 out of 129 seats. The Highlands and Islands voted overwhelmingly for the SNP (except for Orkney and Shetland, which returned Liberal Democrat MSPs).

One of the central planks of the SNP's vision for an independent Scotland is its energy policy. The party leader, Alex Salmond, has said that he wants the country to be the 'Saudi Arabia of renewable energy' – becoming self-sufficient in energy by 2020, and a net exporter of 'clean' electricity.

The Highlands and Islands are central to this plan. In the first half of the 20th century it was one the first regions in the world to develop hydroelectric power on a large scale, and in the last decade, wind turbines have sprung up all over the place. By 2009, renewables provided 27% of Scotland's energy consumption; government targets are for this to rise to 31% in 2011 and 100% by 2020.

But the future of Scotland's energy industry lies not on land, but in the sea: Scotland has access to 25% of Europe's available tidal energy, and 10% of its wave power. The Highlands and Islands are at the leading edge of developing wave, tidal and offshore wind power: a  $\pounds 4$  billion project was launched in 2010 to test marine generating systems in the waters around Orkney, including the Pelamis 'sea snake' wave generator and SeaGen tidal turbines.

# **Development vs Conservation**

In 2010 the Scottish government gave the go-ahead to a 135-mile, high-voltage overhead power line from Beauly (near Inverness) to Denny in
