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
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Why Go?

Venezuela is a land of stunning variety. The country has Andean peaks, endless Caribbean coastline, idvllic offshore islands, grasslands teeming with wildlife, the steamy Amazon and rolling savanna punctuated by flat-topped mountains called tepuis. Those seeking adventure will find hiking, snorkeling, scuba diving, kitesurfing, windsurfing, paragliding and more. Even better, most of these attractions lie within a one-day bus trip of each other.

Venezuela receives considerably fewer visitors than other major South American countries. Tourism infrastructure exists, but it's primarily geared toward domestic travelers. That said, Venezuelans love to have a good time, and that spirit is infectious.

After the death of President Hugo Chávez in March 2013. the future of his socialist 'Bolivarian Revolution' is uncertain. Regardless of who takes power, Venezuela - and indeed all of South America - will be a different place without this controversial and iconic leader.



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Connections

Caracas is Venezuela's main transportation hub, with buses and flights radiating out to the entire country. There are four border crossings to Colombia, with the coastal Maracaibo to Maicao route being the most heavily used by foreign travelers, followed by the Andean route between San Antonio del Táchira and Cúcuta. Only one main road connects Brazil and Venezuela; it leads from Manaus through Boa Vista in Brazil, to the border crossing at Santa Elena de Uairén and continues to Ciudad Guayana. Brazil can also be accessed via remote southern Amazonas and onward to Manaus along the Río Negro. A weekly ferry connects Trinidad from Güiria on the Península de Paria, but no official crossings exist between Venezuela and Guyana.

ITINERARIES

One Week

One week will barely scratch the surface, but you can get a taste. Make your way to the colonial city of Ciudad Bolívar and explore the historical district along the mighty Río Orinoco. From there, fly to the lagoonside village of Canaima, skirting the iconic tabletop *tepui* mountains. Take a boat tour to the base of Salto Ángel (Angel Falls), and spend the night in the jungle. Then head to the Caribbean coast to clock in a few days of beach time in laid-back Puerto Colombia.

One Month

Now we're talking. Set sail for the Andes and learn to paraglide in Mérida, then make your way east across Los Llanos on a wildlife tour. Fly to Canaima and visit Salto Ángel from Ciudad Bolívar and follow up with an outdoor adventure to the Orinoco Delta or a week-long trek to Roraima. Then get some sand in your shoes as you sunbathe and snorkel in the islands of Parque Nacional Mochima.

Essential Food & Drink

» Arepa A grilled corn pancake stuffed with cheese, beef or other fillings – ubiquitous fast food, and often eaten for breakfast

» Pabellón criollo The Venezuelan national dish of shredded beef, black beans, rice and plantains

» Polar beer If there was a national beverage, it would be these icy mini-bottles of brew

» Coffee Aromatic espresso shots of homegrown liquid heaven, served in little plastic cups at the *panadería* (bakery)

» **Chocolate** Not widely exported, Venezuelan chocolate is some of the best in the world
