
# Why Go?

### **Connections**

Brazil shares land borders with every country on the continent except Chile and Ecuador. The most common land crossings for travelers include the epic Amazon river crossing from Belém or Manaus to Leticia (Colombia) or Iquitos (Peru); a trek through the Pantanal, the world's largest wetlands, and out through Corumbá into Bolivia via the daily train link with Santa Cruz; and the waterlogged triborder linking Iguaçu Falls with Ciudad del Este, Paraguay and Puerto Iguazú, Argentina. By air, you can reach most South American capitals directly, including Asunción, Buenos Aires, Caracas, Lima, Montevideo and Santiago (as well as Santa Cruz, Bolivia); and common overland bus routes reach Asunción, Buenos Aires, Montevideo, Santiago and Santa Cruz, Bolivia.

### **ITINERARIES**

#### **Two Weeks**

Get into the thick of it in the Cidade Maravilhosa (Marvelous City), as Rio de Janeiro is nicknamed, taking in the sights, sounds, seductions and samba of South America's most stunning city. Spend a view days dazzled by nature in two of the world's most important ecological hot spots, the Amazon and the Pantanal; get up close to the world's most stupendous waterfall, Iguaçu Falls.

#### **One Month**

Follow the two-week itinerary, but supplement Brazil's greatest hits with visits to some of the most cinematic destinations: beautifully preserved colonial towns in Rio (Paraty) and Minas Gerais (Ouro Prêto and Tiradentes); postcard-perfect beaches in Fernando de Noronha, Bahia, or Florianópolis; miraculous dune desertscapes in Parque Nacional dos Lençóis Maranhenses; and the unique aquatic wonderland of Bonito.

# **Essential Food & Drink**

- Feijoada The national dish: a savory stew of beans, beef and/or pork
- Açaí Blended Amazon palm berries, usually mixed with banana, granola, honey and guaraná syrup
- → Moqueca Seafood stew from Bahia (Bahiana) or Espírito Santo (Capixaba)
- Picanha Brazil's most succulent meat cut, roughly translated as 'rump cap'
- Pão de Queijo Ubiquitous cheese bread made with manioc flour, milk, eggs and cheese
- **Cachaça** Rum-like liquor made from fermented sugarcane juice
- Caipirinha The national cocktail: cachaça, limes & sugar
