

Mumblings Around the Kava Bowl

The Pacific Islands are a varied bunch and in the ocean's vastness, it's not all kava and cocktails. This region has a mindset all of its own that's at once sleepy, stubborn and ingenious. Despite the islands harbouring little violence or danger, corruption is rife. Old customs continue even as islanders face a rapidly modernising world.

You'll hear mumblings about Fiji and the Solomon Islands, which have both seen unrest. RAMSI (Regional Assistance Mission to the Solomon Islands) troops arrived in the Solomon Islands in 2003 to police the nation, while coup-prone Fiji struggles to maintain diplomatic relations with other Pacific nations who don't like the idea of skipping elections and military-based rule.

Shifting Colonial Power & New Democracy

There are also new freedoms in the islands. A referendum for New Caledonia's independence from France is scheduled to take place between 2014 and 2019. Meanwhile French Polynesian president Oscar Temaru has pushed for independence for his country with rocky support. Tongans voted for the first time in 2010 elections – while monarchy-linked nobles (that have reigned for centuries) won that election, there will be another election in 2014.

Ex-colonies like Australia and New Zealand exert considerable influence in the Pacific through their membership of the Pacific Islands Forum, while France and the USA still finance their island territories. Lobbying from Australia resulted in the suspension of Fiji from the Pacific Islands Forum in 2010 for its failure to host elections. Australia continues to lobby for greater regionalism, whereby Pacific nations will act collectively on trade, fishing, waste management and air transport. Under the
