Why Go?


Catalonia feels distinct from the rest of Spain, and its four provinces enclose an impressive wealth of natural splendour. Pyrenean peaks loom above meadows and fertile vineyards, plains are pock-marked with volcanic cones, and rocky coves punctuate sandy beaches.

The Costa Brava's shores are its biggest lure, though travellers will also discover medieval architecture and Jewish history in Girona and Besalú, and Salvador Dalí's gloriously surreal 'theatre-museum' in Figueres.

For adventure, head north where the Pyrenees rise to 3000m peaks. Here, hiking trails weave among valleys and lonely villages are crowned with Romanesque churches and monasteries. Stepping even further back in time, the Roman and Greek ruins of Tarragona and Empúries are among Spain's most impressive. And an entirely different landscape awaits in the Delta de l'Ebre's shimmering wetlands, home to flocks of pirouetting flamingos.

When to Go

Tarragona



May The Costa Brava's beaches are free from crowds, though the water is a little chilly.

Sep The Catalan Pyrenees are aflame in autumnal colours, and the hiking is perfect.

Oct–Nov The museums and galleries of the Dalí circuit are at their quiet best.
