
2 Gallery of BC Ceramics (p112) Perusing the eclectic pottery and picking up a unique local-made souvenir; then wondering how to pack it for home.

Explore Yaletown & Granville Island

Yaletown and Granville Island lie on opposite banks of False Creek but it's easy to see both on one day. Save most of your time for Granville Island with its unique shops and public market. Be sure to stroll the entire island, not just the Public Market end. Poking around the back alleys, you'll find cool artisan studios and you'll also escape the crowds that jam the market area in summer. Johnston St, Cartwright St and Railspur Alley are particularly worth exploring. The pedestrian and traffic entrance to Granville Island is under the south end of Granville Bridge. Here, Anderson St takes you right onto the island. Yaletown is a short miniferry ride from Granville Island. Compact and easy to explore, it primarily radiates a block or two either side of Hamilton St. There are some worthwhile shopping options here and, if you want to join the locals, stay for dinner. The city's renovated warehouse district is stuffed with dining options, a few of them among the city's finest dine-out options where you'll nosh with some of Vancouver's VIPs.

Local Life

→Produce The Granville Island Public Market (p99) is always stuffed with fruit and veg but the summertime farmers market – from June to October – is even better for fresh-picked local treats.

→Beer Most Granville Island Brewing (p103) beverages are now produced in factory quantities off-site, but savvy locals know that the small-batch tipples still made on the island are superior. Hit the brewery's on-site liquor store and pick up a couple.

→Theater Granville Island is the heart of Vancouver's theater scene. Locals save money on main-stage shows by checking the daily half-price deals at www. ticketstonight.ca.

Getting There & Away

→Bus Bus 50 runs from downtown and stops near Granville Island's entrance. Bus 10 is also popular and stops on the south side of Granville Bridge.

→Train The Canada Line runs from downtown to Yaletown-Roundhouse Station, a short walk to all Yaletown's main attractions.

Car There is metered parking in Yaletown. There is free parking (up to three hours) on Granville Island but availability is severely limited at peak times.

→ Miniferries Granville Island is accessible by miniferry service from the West End and Yaletown side of False Creek.
