
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Why Go?

The 'Land of a Million Elephants' oozes magic the moment you spot a Hmong tribeswoman looming from the mist, trek through a glimmering rice paddy, or hear the sonorous call of one of the country's endangered gibbons. It's a place where it's easy to make a quick detour and find yourself well and truly off the traveller circuit: the snaking Mekong River runs through it all, alongside jagged limestone cliffs and brooding jungle. But it's also a place to luxuriate, pampering yourself like a French colonial in a spa, or chilling under a wood-blade fan in a top-notch Gallic restaurant. Old-world refinement is found in pockets right across the country, especially in languid Vientiane and legendary Luang Prabang.

Laos has also acquitted itself well to green tourism, harnessing forests with excellent treks and tribal homestays. Be it flying along mountain zip-lines, elephant riding, exploring subterranean caves or traversing the jungle via dirt-bike, Laos will indelibly burn itself into your memory.



Connections

Well-placed Laos is sandwiched between Vietnam, Cambodia, Thailand, Myanmar (Burma) and China. Roads have improved over recent years thanks to the creation of Chinese trade routes, and many ailing public buses have also been updated. Air travel has progressed, with the national carrier, Lao Airlines, enjoying a fleet of nine new planes, better safety records and regular flights to Bangkok, Hanoi, Singapore and Siem Reap; its routes cover the entire country, making it easier than ever to see more in less time.

ITINERARIES

One Week

After spending a few days sampling the Soviet-Franco architecture, sophisticated bars and Asian-fusion cuisine of riverside **Vientiane**, travel north to the unforgettable ancient city of **Luang Prabang** to experience its temples, crumbling villas, pampering spas, myriad monks and Gallic cuisine.

Two Weeks

Fly to **Vientiane**, imbibe its fine accommodation and cuisine for a few days then head north to **Vang Vieng** for climbing, kayaking and tubing in serene karst scenery. Leisurely move on to **Luang Prabang**, the jewel of Southeast Asia and a place so bedecked with charming bakeries, temples, boutiques and restaurants you may not want to leave. After a few days here take a two-day slow boat up the Mekong River to **Huay Xai**, having already booked yourself in for the memorable Gibbon Experience (p323) and an overnight stay in a jungle tree house. If you've got time, head up to **Luang Namtha** for an ecoconscious trek in the wild **Nam Ha National Protected Area** (NPA). From here you can fly back to Vientiane to catch your flight out.
