
From the legacy of mighty empires to the brutality of civil wars and genocide, the Mekong region has witnessed a past as dramatic as any the world has seen.

# The Mekong Region Today

### A Remarkable Turnaround

Rewind just a generation and Cambodia, Laos and Vietnam were pariah states, boycotted by much of the Western world. Scarred by decades of war and instability, the region was considered by many Western experts to be a basket case. How times change. Despite the region's communist history, its leaders proved themselves to be open to Western economic models as they balanced Eastern communism with Western capitalism. Touchdown today and the bad old days seem but a footnote in history. Like the river that runs through it, the Mekong region is well and truly going places.

### **Economic Highs**

Much of the region is closer than it has been for some time thanks to the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean). With the exception of the occasional dispute between Cambodia and Thailand over their shared border (see p231), the countries of the region are at peace and the talk is of cooperation not conflict. All seem to be weathering the global financial crisis better than many of their counterparts in the Western world. Asean is moving towards a free trade area that should liberate commerce between the neighbouring countries of the Mekong region and help keep the economy on track.

Visa-free travel between Asean members and the emergence of budget airlines like Air Asia and Jetstar has kickstarted a regional tourism rush that is redefining travel patterns in the countries of the Mekong region. There are also plans to revolutionise, with China pledging to build a high-speed rail link from Kunming to Bangkok via languid Luang Prabang within the next five years.
