

## Why Go?

Floating in the Gulf of Guinea, this two-island nation, Africa's second-smallest, blends natural wonders with a gripping history. Once a vast network of plantations and a centre of global cocoa production, São Tomé & Príncipe (STP) has suffered an economic collapse since independence from Portugal in 1975. In the countryside, squatters inhabit once great mansions; in the capital, historic colonial buildings slowly decay on broken streets. Nevertheless, the country remains amazingly safe and welcoming to visitors, particularly ecotourists, for whom the advancing jungle is a delight. This is particularly true on tidy and unspoiled Príncipe, an island of just 7000 people. A canopy of green broken by spires of primordial rock, Príncipe is a magnificent Lost World, offering fantastic beaches, jungle exploration, snorkelling, fishing, birdwatching and a handful of interesting (if expensive) accommodation options, with minimal tourist pressure. While both islands have their natural rewards, Príncipe should not be missed.

## When to Go

### São Tomé



**Jun–Sep** Dry season; ideal for climbing Pico de São Tomé or trekking the Volta a Ilha.

**Oct–May** Rainy season; particularly wet in the southwest.

**Year-round** Temperatures in the high 20s (°C); areas of cloud, rain and sun can be found any time.
