Connections

Ireland is just about as far west as you can go in Europe – next stop, North America. But the Emerald Isle can serve as a stepping stone between mainland Europe and the UK. Ferry services run from Roscoff and Cherbourg in northern France to Rosslare (near Wexford) in southeast Ireland. After exploring Ireland you can continue your travels via one of the many ferries linking Ireland with Great Britain: from Rosslare to Fishguard and Pembroke (both in Wales); from Cork to Swansea (Wales); from Dublin or Dun Laoghaire to Holyhead (Wales); from Dublin or Belfast to the Isle of Man and Liverpool (England); from Belfast to Cairnryan (Scotland); and from Larne to Troon (April to October only) or Cairnryan (both Scotland).

You can travel direct by coach (via a ferry crossing) from Dublin or Belfast to London and several other UK cities. Budget airlines fly direct from Dublin and Belfast to London, Cardiff, Edinburgh and other UK destinations.

ITINERARIES

One Week

Spend a couple of days in Dublin ambling through the excellent national museums, and gorging yourself on Guinness and good company in Temple Bar. Get medieval in Kilkenny before heading on to Cork and discovering why they call it 'The Real Capital'. Meander through lush, idyllic West Cork and take in the friendly spirit and melodious accents of its denizens.

Two Weeks

Follow the one-week itinerary, then make your way from West Cork up to touristy Killarney and the Ring of Kerry on your way to bohemian Galway. Using Galway as your base, explore the alluring Aran Islands and the hills of Connemara. Finally, head north to experience the newly optimistic vibe in fast-changing Belfast.

Essential Food & Drink

- » **Champ** Northern Irish dish of mashed potatoes with spring onions (scallions).
- » Colcannon Mashed potatoes with cabbage and fried onion.
- » Farl Triangular flatbread in Northern Ireland and Donegal.
- » Irish stew Lamb stew with potatoes, onions and thyme.
- » Soda bread Wonderful bread white or brown, sweet or savoury made from very soft Irish flour and buttermilk.
- **» Stout** Dark, almost black beer made with roasted barley; famous brands are Guinness in Dublin, and Murphy's and Beamish & Crawford in Cork.

Irish whiskey Around 100 different types are produced by only four distilleries: Jameson, Bushmills, Cooley and recently reopened Kilbeggan.
