
# Why Go?

You may be tempted to speed out of Vegas with your foot on the gas and Zion firmly in your sights – after all, the park is less than three hours away via the interstate. But once you cross the state line, consider slowing down to explore the vast wilderness that surrounds you: Snow Canyon State Park, St George and Cedar Breaks National Monument are all worthy detours, with their own superb vistas and an array of fun activities, including mountain biking, cycling, climbing and cross-country skiing.

Even if time is short, it's likely you'll be based outside the park anyway, unless you've got a coveted park campsite. As far as towns go, Springdale is the pick of the bunch, with easy access and a range of accommodations and restaurants. For something a bit more off the beaten path, consider sleepy Cedar City for Kolob Canyons access, or idyllic Glendale, perfectly situated in between Zion, Bryce and Kanab.

# When to Go

# Zion National Park



# May-Aug

Soaring heat; rains increase the risk of flash floods in July and August.

### Sep-Nov

Clear, warm days; festivals in Cedar City and St George.

### Dec-Apr

Snow at higher elevations; some trails may be closed.

# **Springdale**

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When the cottonwoods are budding against the red cliffs, Springdale is the perfect little park town, though more frequently it's a bottleneck of traffic entering Zion National Park. The main drag - well, the only drag features eclectic cafes, galleries and restaurants touting local produce and organic ingredients. Many residents were drawn here for the surroundings, but you will occasionally run into a lifelong local who thinks they're 'just rocks.'



#### **Grafton Ghost Town GHOST TOWN**

The freely accessible Grafton ghost town. outside Rockville, achieved its 15 minutes of fame in 1969 as the setting for the bicycle scene in Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid. Originally settled in 1859, the town never amounted to much. A restored 1886 school and church, a well-maintained cemetery and some pioneer cabins remain. In Rockville, 3.5 miles west of Springdale, take Bridge Rd north; cross the bridge and turn right on Grafton Rd. After half a mile follow the main road, which bears left and becomes gravel. A mile further, bear right at the sign. After another 2 miles, you'll pass the cemetery on your left, then drive a quarter-mile further to the ghost town. Park at the red gate.

#### La Verkin Overlook VIEWPOINT

West of Virgin on Hwy 9, before La Verkin, a 1.5-mile gravel-and-dirt road leads south to La Verkin Overlook. Stop for a fantastic 360-degree view of the surrounding 40 sq miles, from Zion to the Pine Valley Mountains. Trails lead along the ridge above the Virgin River. This is a great sunset perch.



## **Mountain Biking**

The area around Zion has a handful of heart-pumping mountain-bike trails through the desert - these are wicked-fun rides. The two most famous trail systems are the JEM Trail - fast singletrack through desert scrub along the canyon rim - and Gooseberry Mesa, a more technical slickrock route similar to what you'll find in Moab (and not for beginners). Note that Gooseberry Mesa access is rugged; you don't absolutely need high-clearance 4WD, but it is recommended. Further afield, the area around St George is another good spot for road and

mountain-bike trails. Ask at the bike stores for maps and more information, Zion Adventure Company also runs bike tours.

### **Tubing**

Tubing is prohibited within Zion but is quite popular outside the park. From Memorial Day through Labor Day, Zion Adventure Company and Zion Outfitters (p85) rent out river tubes (\$17 per day), unless the water level is too low (or too high). The float stretches about 2.5 miles, and lasts from 90 minutes to two hours depending on the water flow. Good river play places include Springdale River Park, and from the campground at Zion Canvon Campground & RV Resort (p85).
