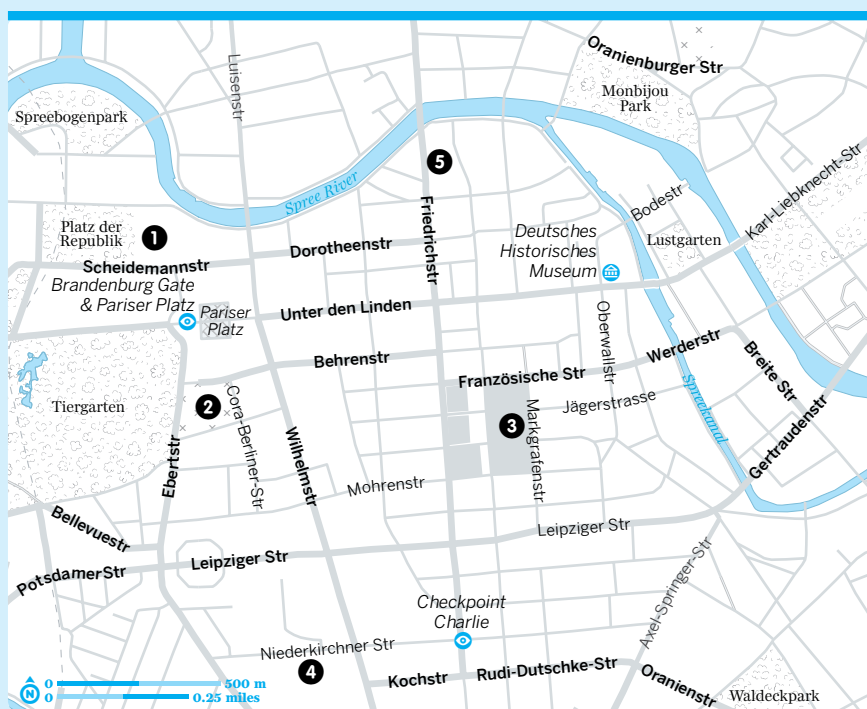


# Historic Mitte

## Explore: Historic Mitte

A cocktail of culture, commerce and history, Historic Mitte packs it in when it comes to blockbuster sights: the Reichstag, the Brandenburg Gate, the Holocaust Memorial and Checkpoint Charlie are all within its confines. Cutting through it all is Unter den Linden, a chic boulevard stretching from Pariser Platz past a phalanx of imposing structures built under various Prussian kings and reflecting the one-time grandeur of the royal family.

Alas, Unter den Linden is pretty deserted after dark; fortunately there is some action along Friedrichstrasse, which bisects it. Since reunification, this strip has reclaimed its role as a trendy shopping, drinking and dining hub. In fact, Friedrichstrasse and Gendarmenmarkt, Berlin's most beautiful square one block east, boast the greatest density of fancy restaurants (several with a Michelin star or two) in town.

Walking is the best way to get around this area, although buses 100 and 200, which run along Unter den Linden, can come in handy if your feet are sore.

## Local Life

➔ **Glamour Shopping** Brand-name bunnies flock to Friedrichstrasse to give their credit cards a serious workout.

Aside from boutiques, the Friedrichstadtpassagen, led by the stunningly designed Galeries Lafayette (p92), beckon with top-flight Berlin and international designers.

➔ **High-Brow Culture** Music and theatre fans especially regularly flock to this part of town to treat their ears to concerts at the Konzerthaus Berlin (p91), theatre at the Maxim Gorki (p91) and opera at the Komische Oper (p91).

➔ **Power of Words** What's better than spending a night off in front of the TV? Spending it browsing around a bookstore, of course. Open until 11pm, Dussmann (p91), the self-titled 'cultural department store', is an eldorado for bookworms and also has a huge music selection.

## Getting There & Away

➔ **Bus** Nos 100 and 200 run along Unter den Linden from Alexanderplatz.

➔ **S-Bahn** S1 and S2/25 stop at Brandenburger Tor and at Friedrichstrasse.

➔ **Tram** The M1 travels from Museumsinsel to Prenzlauer Berg via Friedrichstrasse.

➔ **U-Bahn** Stadtmitte (U2, U6), Französische Strasse (U6) and Hausvogteiplatz (U2) are all convenient for Gendarmenmarkt. For Unter den Linden, get off at Brandenburger Tor (U55), Friedrichstrasse (U6) or Französische Strasse (U6).

For an engaging overview of the Berlin Wall and related key Cold War sites scattered around the city, visit the Mauerinformation exhibit in the Brandenburger Tor U-Bahn station. Aside from photographs and an aerial map, it presents a film about the border installations and an opportunity to rent a Berlin Wall audioguide for a more in-depth experience.
