

Welcome to London

One of the world's great – and most visited – cities, London has something for everyone: from culture to fine food and a buzzing party scene. Its energy is intoxicating and its diversity inspiring.

This city is deeply multicultural, with one in three Londoners foreign-born. Britain may have voted for Brexit (although the majority of Londoners didn't), but London remains one of the world's most cosmopolitan cities, and diversity infuses daily life, food, music, fashion and art. It inspires festivals such as the now-famed Notting Hill Carnival, and the new annual Borough of Culture celebrations.

London is also a city of contrasts. On the one hand, it is constantly changing: witness the evolving skyline, with its statement skyscrapers; the endless stream of new restaurants, pop-up bars and concept stores; and the myriad new artists, from fashion designers to musicians, that have emerged from its creative milieu. No matter how often you visit, you'll always find something new.

On the other hand, this thirst for innovation has been facilitated by a strong sense of history and of how London came to be London. The city's buildings are striking milestones in a unique and beguiling biography, and many of them – Big Ben, Tower Bridge, the Tower of London – are instantly recognisable landmarks. Amazingly, all this history and culture leave glorious amounts of green spaces, which are a joy to explore or relax in.



September

The end of summer and start of autumn is a lovely time to be in town, with comedy festivals and a chance to look at London properties normally shut to the public.

☆ Greenwich Comedy **Festival** early Sep

This week-long laugh fest - London's largest comedy festival – brings big names and emerging acts to the National Maritime Museum.

★ The Mayor's Thames Festival

Sep

Celebrating the River Thames, this cosmo politan festival (www.totallythames.org) brings fairs, street theatre, music, food stalls, fireworks and river races, culminating in the superb Night Procession.

Open House London mid-Sep

For a weekend in mid-September the public is invited in to see over 800 heritage buildings throughout the capital that are normally off-limits (www.openhouselondon. org.uk; UCL at Here East pictured above).

Some of the best, most eye-catching and exciting design works from over 40 countries are displayed at Somerset House (pictured below) on the Strand in the heart of London in this monthlong festival (www.londondesign biennale.com).
