


THE TREE CHUCKER

PLAÇA DEL PI

PLAÇA DEL PI

This city square takes its name from the pine tree that grows there. Legend has it that a giant once came to the city gates, using an uprooted pine tree as a staff to help him walk. The gatekeepers thought he was going to chop up the tree and sell the wood, so they demanded that he pay a tax. The angry giant lost his temper and threw the tree over the city walls. It landed in the square and began to grow.



SWEET STORY

CARRER GRAN DE GRÀCIA

In 1828, Josep Vidal i Granés, a baker, fell ill in a district of Barcelona called Gràcia. He vowed that if he got better he would make an annual trip to the St. Medir Hermitage. When he recovered, he set off, and on his return he threw broad beans to everyone in the street. Why? Because they figure in the legend of St. Medir. Over time the baker's pilgrimage has turned into a big springtime street parade called the Festival of St. Medir. and sweets instead of broad beans are thrown out to everyone on the parade route. There are so many sweets, it's called pluja de caramels - candy rain!



CASA DE LES PUNXES

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This medieval-looking building gets its name, which means the House of Spikes, from its pointed rooftop. It was designed over a hundred years ago to look like the kind of castle where a knightly hero such as Sant Jordi (Saint George) would live. Inside there is an exhibition on Barcelona's favourite Saint, said to have been a brave knight who saved a princess by killing a dragon with his holy sword.

ALL OVER BARCELONA

Gegants (giants) play a part in most Barcelona festivals, parading through town and dancing for the crowds. They represent characters from the Bible, history and legend. The city has its own official gegants, King Jaume (James) and his wife Violant, who always take part in the big La Mercè Festival in September (see page 28). In the 1200s, King Jaume I saved Barcelona from French forces and earned his status as a hero of the city. The gegant king and queen live in the City Hall when they are not parading.



ALL OVER BARCELONA



Antoni Gaudí is one of Barcelona's great artistic heroes.

He designed some famous Barcelona buildings, a park and an incredible cathedral that is still being finished. His work features dragons and sea monsters, magical forests and seaweed.

Follow in his footsteps to discover some of his secrets.





A DRAGON AT THE GATE

THE DRAGON GATE, GÜELL PAVILIONS


Gaudí loved using dragons in his work. This striking gateway he designed represents a mythical dragon guarding a magical garden – the Garden of the Hesperides – where golden apples grew. The dragon looks hungry, with his gaping mouth and forked tongue sticking out! In the Greek myth his name was Ladon.

MOSAIC CASTLE

TORRE BELLESGUARD, CARRER DE BELLESGUARD

The site of this medieval-looking building was once a real castle belonging to a Barcelona king called Martin the Humane. Gaudí was inspired by the old castle when he built the new version, but he added his own style, too. He liked to decorate his buildings with bright mosaic pieces, called *trencadís*, and there are lots around the home, some on the very top of the high tower.

MEET THE MAN

THE GAUDÍ EXPERIENCE, CARRER DE LARRARD

Here you can put on a 4D headset and enter the virtual reality world of Gaudí, walking through the streets he knew and watching him work, or flying over the town like a bird to see his creations.

Afterwards, you can even take a selfie next to his statue sitting on a bench.



PARK GÜELL

SIT ON A SERPENT

Gaudi's park is like no other in the world. Visitors can walk through a forest of stone trees, and there's even a tiled bench shaped like a sea serpent, where people stop to get a great view over the town. There's also a fairytale caretaker's house and a giant lizard nicknamed el drac (the dragon) at the entrance.


A FISHY GIANT


FISH, BARCELONETA BEACH

Barcelona has its own giant goldfish. It's a sculpture called Peix (Fish) by Frank Gehry and it sits looking out over the sea, as if it's about to jump in for a swim. It's made of golden-coloured stainless steel strips that look like scales when the sunlight reflects off them.

In 1862, a Barcelona inventor called Narcis Monturiol i Estarriol began experimenting in the harbour with the world's first engine-powered submarine. It was called Ictineo II, and because Monturiol couldn't afford to build it with metal he used olive wood. He made many successful dives around the harbour but he eventually ran out of money and his sub was sold for scrap. There's a replica of it down by the sea.

SWEETS AND SINGING FESTA MAJOR DE BARCELONETA, PLAÇA DE LA BARCELONETA


Barceloneta has its own festival at the end of September. There is a parade with fiery devils, gegants and a big sweetie cannon that shoots sweets at the crowd, fired by someone dressed as a historical general. Barceloneta's gegants are Pep Barceló, a giant fisherman, and Maria la Néta, who carries a basket of fish on her head.
