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
Why Go?

When to Go

May-Jun Prime birdwatching season happily coincides with the two driest months and fewer crowds.

Aug It's full throttle in Reykjavík, the country teems with visitors and it's almost always light.

Nov-Apr The best months for Northern Lights and bare minimalism.



Iceland Highlights

- 1 Reykjavík** (p595)
Partying till dawn on the weekend pub crawl *djammid*, then hitting excellent museums, shops and cafés.
- 2 Snæfellsnes Peninsula** (p609) Riding horses, climbing glaciers, trekking lava fields, or soaking in hot-pots.
- 3 Golden Circle** (p604)
Joining the droves exploring

the scintillating Gullfoss waterfall, exploding geysers, and the nation's birthplace, rift valley Þingvellir.

- 4 Þíð** (p607) Exploring black-sand beaches and offshore rock formations.
- 5 Þórmörk** (p607)
Taking a wilderness hike in this dramatic valley.
- 6 Húsavík** (p610) Going

whale watching in Húsavík or Reykjavík.

- 7 Skaftafell** (p608)
Exhausting your camera's memory card at Skaftafell in Vatnajökull National Park and nearby Jökulsárlón glacial lagoon.
- 8 Blue Lagoon** (p605)
Swimming through steam clouds at this world-famous milky-blue geothermal pool.

REYKJAVÍK

The world's most northerly capital combines colourful buildings, wild nightlife and a capricious soul to brilliant effect. You'll find Viking history, captivating museums, cool

music, and off-beat cafes and bars. And it's a superb base for touring Iceland's natural wonders.

Reykjavík's heart lies between Tjörnin (the Pond) and the harbour, and along Laugavegur, with nearly everything for visitors within walking distance.
