risen, fallen and left behind their indelible mark. More recently, what other country could produce such rebellious and relentlessly creative spirits as Salvador Dalí, Pablo Picasso and Antoni Gaudí and place them front and centre in public life?

For all such talk, this is a country that lives very much in the present. This book is, therefore, not broken up into sights or hotels or restaurants, or primarily into regions, but into five chapters that take you to the very epicentre of Spanish life:

- **Tradition & Passion:** Flamenco, Food & Family
- **The Good Things in Life:** Living la Buena Vida
- **Living History:** Monuments of Art & Architecture
- **Modernity:** Design, Style & Innovation in Spanish Life
- **Adventure:** Exploring Wild Spain

Spain rewards those who visit in the spirit of full immersion and this book takes you into the heart of the Spanish experience. Perhaps you'll sense it along a crowded post-midnight street when all the world has come out to play. Or maybe that moment will come when a flamenco performer touches something deep in your soul. Whenever it occurs, you'll find yourself nodding in recognition: this is a place where anything can happen.

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Food & Drink

Europe's culinary powerhouse

Spanish food is one of the culinary world's most exciting stories, not to mention one of the most enjoyable reasons to visit the country. Food stands at the centre of Spanish living, at once a grand national passion and a touchstone of daily life. Whether at work or at play, Spaniards come together over a meal and generally agree that food is one of few things that unites this notoriously argumentative country.

Whether it's in the genius of tapas – going out for tapas (called *pintxos* in the Basque Country) is a recurring ritual among Spaniards – the splendid subtlety of *jamón*, the refinement of olive oil, the wonderful world of Spanish wines, or in the sheer perfection of paella, Spanish food is built upon the subtle interplay between tradition and innovation, between complexity and simplicity. As a starting point, the laws of traditional Spanish cooking are deceptively simple: take the freshest ingredients and interfere with them as little as possible. From there, anything is possible, and the infinite variety of food, drink and gastronomic experiences here is reason alone to visit.

Spaniards love to travel in their own country. They especially love to do so in pursuit of the perfect meal. Tell a Spaniard that you're on your way to a particular place and they're sure to start salivating

at the mere thought of the local speciality and a favourite restaurant at which to enjoy it. That's because eating is more than a functional pastime to be squeezed between other more important tasks; it's a social event to be enjoyed with friends and one always taken seriously enough to have adequate hours allocated for the purpose. Following in their footsteps is one of life's great pleasures.

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A Day in Spain



Spain operates very much to its own schedule, and the late nights and unusually late meal times can take some getting used to for visitors.

The Spanish working day begins at home with breakfast, which is traditionally sweet – a pastry or croissant with coffee is typical. Work (and school) usually begins at 9am, although many shops don't open until 10am. Many workers break for a coffee and perhaps a snack mid-morning, around 10.30am.

Lunch is the main meal of the day. Although restaurants might open as early as 1pm, the normal time for lunch is 2pm or 2.30pm, even later on weekends or holidays. Tapas bars usually open earlier and many Spaniards will drop by for an aperitif – a pre-lunch tapa or two, and a drink. This is particularly common on weekends or during holiday periods. Although times are changing, most smaller shops close at 2pm and often don't reopen until late afternoon, usually 5pm, but sometimes 4pm. Larger shops usually stay open all day.

Lunch is a sit-down affair, consisting of a starter, a main and a dessert. Until recently, many Spaniards went home for lunch, usually followed by a siesta before

returning to work late afternoon. The demands of modern life – in Spanish cities, few workers now live close to where they work, and most lunch breaks last only an hour – mean that this is often not possible these days. In the absence of a home-cooked meal, workers commonly eat in *casas de comidas*, simple restaurants that offer cheap, home-cooked, three-course meals, known as the *menu del día*.

Modern Spanish workers finish work around 5pm or 6pm, later for those who work in smaller shops, which often don't close until 8pm. Families with small children or those who have school the next day might eat earlier, but otherwise dinner – which, like lunch, may be preceded by an aperitif in a bar – rarely begins before 9pm and is often as late as 10pm or even later, especially on weekends. In cities, nightclubs rarely open before midnight, bars rarely close before 1am (3am on weekends), and many nightclubs stay open until dawn.

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

Irresistible Mediterranean appeal

The economic engine of the country, northeastern Spain is something of a world apart. Catalonia has always sought to assert its own identity, at times within the Spanish union, at times not, especially in recent decades. And yet, from here, and from Valencia, the Balearic Islands and Aragón, come so many characteristics that the world has come to know as quintessentially Spanish.

Valencia is less the home of paella than its birthplace, and is also known for its iconic festivals. The story of Spain and its powerful historical kings could not have happened without Sos del Rey Católico, located in the rolling, pre-Pyrenean hill country of Aragón and the 15th-century birthplace of Fernando II. For better or

worse, Fernando II would, with Isabel, unite Spain, end seven centuries of Muslim occupation and cement Spain's Christian identity in perpetuity. And the essence of Spain's Mediterranean appeal – its balmy climate, its postcard-pretty beaches, its feel-good summers – very much resides in the country's northeast.

The irresistible energy of Spain's cities finds a highpoint in Barcelona, where architecture serves as a signpost to Spain's free-wheeling creativity in the city-wide creations of Antoni Gaudí. Food, too, dominates life here to the point of obsession. Barcelona is one serious food city in its own right with celebrity chefs, gastronomic societies and astonishing variety, drawing as it does on an extraordinarily

rich landscape of *mar y montaña* (sea and mountains), of centuries-old traditions and a love of everything new. And it is in the hinterland, from the Pyrenees with their beautiful mountains and Romanesque churches to Salvador Dalí's zany legacy in the Costa Brava, that many of Spain's original attractions reside.

Spanish is spoken and universally understood in these parts, but you'll also hear Catalan (which can sound like a mix of Spanish, French and Italian) and a host of dialects up and down the Mediterranean coast.

Window to the Spanish soul

Welcome to the Spanish heartland. It was here in the Spanish interior, high atop the *meseta* (plateau) in what we now know as Castilla y Leon, Castilla-La Mancha, Extremadura and Madrid, that the Spanish character was forged. So many essential elements of Spanish culture spring from here, from the Castilian language itself to culinary mainstays such as roasted meats and hearty soups and stews, not to mention *manchego* cheese and some of the country's best *jamón* varieties, air-dried by the sere winds of the Spanish high country. This climate – bitterly cold winters, searingly hot summers – is so powerful that it dictates everything from the rhythms and seasons of daily life in the region to the food and character of

the people. In the depths of winter, central Spain's inhabitants hunker down, taking refuge in their cities and villages and in their cuisine. Come summer, they evacuate to the beach.

Down through history, the kings of Castilla have held the line here, building a wonderful world of castles atop seemingly every rocky crag and fortress-like cities such Segovia and Toledo. When it came time in 1561 for a capital to be chosen for all eternity, Felipe II chose Madrid because he wanted 'a city fulfilling the function of a heart located in the middle of the body'. Across the Spanish interior, ancient stone villages that time forgot keep alive the traditions of Old Spain as

a necessary counterpoint to the energy and drive that so distinguish the cities of contemporary Spain. More than anything else, it is this sense of history that defines the region.

Yes, there are Roman ruins across the region, and the architecture is very often sublime. But central Spain is no hoary old museum piece. This is also the land of Don Quixote, Cervantes' quirky literary creation for the ages, and of Madrid, one of the most dynamic cities on the planet.

Dramatic coastlines and unique cultures

One of Spain's least-known corners, northwestern Spain – Galicia, Asturias, Cantabria, La Rioja and the Basque Country – is the antithesis of Spain's reputation for 'sun, sand and sangría'. Buffeted for the most part by strong Atlantic winds, Galicia in particular has an unpredictable climate of cold winters and sometimes disappointing summers. But there is nothing disappointing about finding so many experiences that you just don't find elsewhere, including Celtic cultural roots, dramatic cliffs and stunning fishing villages along Spain's most dramatic coastline, and food and festivals about which everyone else in Spain is known to salivate.

Food is a recurring theme up here. San Sebastián could lay claim to being

Europe's favourite culinary capital, with more Michelin stars per capita attached to its restaurants than any other city on earth, quite apart from being utterly gorgeous as a stately relic from Europe's belle époque. The Basque love of food – creative *pintxos* (Basque tapas), steaks and seafood – sees food elevated to an art form. And perhaps more than any other region up here, the Basques see themselves as different and one look at their language alone – Basque is an ancient language with no known links to any other modern tongue – will tell you why. For all their tradition, the Basques and their neighbours in La Rioja pride themselves on that tradition–innovation seesaw that is such a feature in modern Spain. This is

Spain's most creative culinary laboratory and Bilbao's Guggenheim is the architectural poster child for the New Spain, but the Basques will most likely sip on a time-honoured Rioja red while they enjoy them.

Just across the provincial border, in Asturias and Cantabria, it's a land of cider and strong cheeses and hearty winter stews. The coastal villages here are intimate and as beautiful as any in Spain, cities like Gijón and Oviedo are up-and-coming artistic hubs, and the Picos de Europa could just be Europe's most arresting vertical sight, with hiking possibilities at every turn.

South Spain

The cradle of quintessential Spain

If there is a region that most conforms to the Spanish stereotype, it's the country's south. Andalucía in particular is a world of whitewashed villages clinging to mountain perches – Ronda, Arcos de la Frontera and the other-worldly Alpujarras, for example – and cities of exotic architectural magnificence, most notably in Granada, Seville and Córdoba. There is something about a cobblestone street fronted by perfect whitewash and bedecked by cascading bougainvillea that screams 'Spain!' like few other images. Except perhaps the delicate horseshoe arches of Córdoba's Mezquita. Or the exquisite grandeur of Granada's Alhambra against the snow-capped backdrop of the Sierra Nevada. Or the orange trees and horse-drawn

carriages and hanging *jamóns* in every bar in Seville. Baked by fierce summers and grateful for mild winters, Andalucía is a caricature of the Spanish experience.

Andalucía and its oft-forgotten neighbour Murcia are also large enough to offer up surprises, adding depth and variety to a journey here. Málaga is a Mediterranean city par excellence, rich in art galleries and a love of life Spanish-style. Carefree Cádiz just happens to be one of the oldest cities in Europe. And the region's wild landscapes are much underrated – the Sierra Nevada is brilliant for summer hiking and winter skiing, a network of protected parks receive few visitors, and wildlife, including the world's most endangered cat species, the charismatic Iberian

lynx, as well as flamingos, inhabit pretty valleys and the world-class Parque Nacional de Doñana. Not far away, the triangle of Jerez de la Frontera, El Puerto de Santa María and Sanlúcar de Barrameda could just be the sherry capital of the world, not to mention the wellspring of flamenco, that most Spanish of musical genres.

They speak Spanish down here and are very proud to do so, but the southern version of the language can take some getting used to. In keeping with their relaxed approach to life, locals speak a casual form that often truncates words in a way that can be difficult for first-timers to understand.
