When to Go

High Season (Jun–mid-Sep)

Weather at its best. Accommodation rates at their highest (especially in August). Tourist peak in Dublin, Kerry, southern and western coasts.

Shoulder Season (Easter–May, mid-Sep–Oct)


Weather often good: sun and rain in May; 'Indian summers' and often warm in September. Summer crowds and accommodation rates drop off.

Low Season (Nov–Feb)

Reduced opening hours from October to Easter; some destinations close. Cold and wet weather throughout the country; fog can reduce visibility. Big city attractions operate as normal.

THE SHANNON REGION

CLIFFS OF MOHER B3

The towering stone faces of these iconic cliffs have a jaw-dropping dramatic beauty that's enlivened by scores of seabirds, including cute little puffins. Along the coast are appealing villages like music-filled Ennistimon and the surfer mecca of Lahinch.

THE BURREN C3

Discover lost dolmens and abandoned abbeys among the arid expanses of the Burren. Vistas of the rocky moonscape stretch in all directions from the tiny village of Carron, where wildflowers that bloom in this bare, ethereal landscape are made into perfumes.

ADARE C4

Adare's reputation as 'Ireland's prettiest village' centres on its clutch of perfectly preserved 19th-century thatched cottages, which today house craft shops and

THE WEST

CONNEMARA B3

A frigged coast of tiny coves and beaches is the Connemara Peninsula's beautiful border with the Atlantic. Wandering characterful roads bring you from one charming village to another. Inland, fantastically desolate valleys, green hills, yellow wildflowers and wild streams provide elemental beauty.

GALWAY CITY C3

Ireland's liveliest city literally hums through the night at music-filled pubs where you can hear three old guys playing spoons and fiddles or a hot, young band. Join the locals as they bounce from place to place and enjoy the craic.

CARROWMORE MEgalithic CEMETERY C2

One of the most significant megalithic monuments in Europe, the collection of stone circles, passage tombs and dolmens at Carrowmore is a fascinating mystery, especially its mathematical relationship with the rising and setting of the sun at Halloween.

ARAN ISLANDS B3

Easily visible from the coast of counties Galway and Clare along the Wild Atlantic Way, the rocky, windswept Aran Islands sing their own siren song to travellers who find their desolate beauty beguiling. Ancient forts here are some of the oldest in Ireland.



ITINERARIES

DUBLIN, WICKLOW & MEATH

Dublin 01

Spend two days in the capital sampling the top sights and restaurants, and perhaps a theatre performance.

County Wicklow 013

Spend a day exploring the delights of Enniskerry and Powerscourt, and another touring the Wicklow Mountains and Glendalough.

County Meath 010

On day five, head north into County Meath and visit Brú na Bóinne, Tara and the site of Battle of the Boyne.

WESTERN WANDER

Galway H12

Three nights based here provides time to soak up the city's cultural delights, followed by a day's scenic drive along the Connemara coastline.

Ennis H4

Enjoy an overnight stay in Ennis, where you can enjoy a trad music session in one of its pubs.

Dingle E16

Explore Dingle town the afternoon you arrive; the next day take a harbour cruise to see Fungie the dolphin, then motor around Sea Head Drive.

Killarney F17

Stay for two nights and explore Killarney National Park, then drive (or take a coach tour) around the scenic splendours of the famous Ring of Kerry.

NORTHERN DELIGHTS

Belfast P6


Enjoy two days sightseeing, including a black-taxi tour. On the third take a Game of Thrones tour.
